FATAL ACCIDENT IN EKFRID

While preparing to retire to his bed on Tuesday night, Wm. R. Dobie, aged 81 years, a well-known and esteemed retired farmer, fell down stairs at his home on the Moss and Ekfrid townships, and instantly killed.
