REV. BALL RETURNS TO TORONTO
Toronto, Ont.—The members and friends of Chestnut St. B.M.E. Church are congratulating Rev. R. A. Ball, the grand old man of British Methodism, upon his re-appointment to this pastorate.

A few years ago Rev. Ball served his present church for six years, and under his pastorate the church was greatly improved, making rapid strides along all lines. After serving the B.M.E. Church in Winnipeg, he was re-appointed charge in 1922, and already plans for the improvement of the neat and commodious building on Chestnut St. are under way.

The site of the present edifice was purchased 79 years ago by a group of escaped slaves.

Rev. Ball, who was born in St. Catharines 78 years ago, is still hale and hearty; his is a great power in this community, and an energetic leader of his people. He will be remembered by many, as the head of the once famous Ball Family of Jubilee Singers which toured Canada and the U.S.A.. Mrs. Ball is still a sweet singer, and their daughter, Mrs. Edna Parker is an accomplished musician. Rev. R. R. Ball, pastor of Zion Church, Hartford, Conn., is a son.
