THE GREAT COTTON COMBINE. On Saturday the gigantic combination of the Canadian cotton mills was completed.

The high tax papers do not like to speak of it as a "combine"; they call it a "consolidation." Nevertheless, it is a combine, and the biggest in Canada. With control of all the cotton factories,

a capital of \$5,000,000 and a high tax on all British and United States coston goods, the combine managers can do as they please. Already the public are the sufferers. Though the price of the raw material is 2 cents per pound lower than at this time last year, the consumers of cotton have not reaped any benefit from it, but on the contrary, as pointed out by the Montreal Trade Bulletin, colored cottons have actually been advanced on account of the syndicate o manufacturers having obtained control of the output. The sum of the whole matter is "that in spite of the fact that the raw material is about as low as it ever was, having declined about 25 per cent. of late, the people are compelled to pay higher prices for the manufactured goods than those ruling prior to the big drop in raw cotton. This must mean an enormous gain to the cotton manufacturers who now have the power to fix their own prices and profits, and such power is bound to be abused.

The Trade Bulletin suggests that the ombine should not carry things with too high a hand, as if such corporations, who pay for their privileges in subscription to their beneficiaries in Parliament, were ever contented with anything short of their pound of flesh. The only antidote for these combines is to take off the duty on their products.

CYCLONES AND TORNADOES.

Though it is charged by the New York Sun that the cyclone of Thursday and Friday last which effected so great destruction of life and property in the Western States, developed in far west Canadian territory. it is known that no trouble was caused by it till the cyclone and its accompanying tornadoes got beyond Helena, Montana Then the cyclone traveled through Wyom ing diagonally, centering in Chevenne or Thursday. Here it met with opposition, and began to gather itself together.

A cyclone is a whirling storm, according to an authority on the subject. The cold winds of the north and the warm winds of the south meet and begin to revolve around a center, turning in the opposite direction to the hands of a watch. Sometimes a cyclone will cover hundreds of miles

in breadth. Cyclones shape their course in the direction of the least

pressure, and that is why this cyclone traveled south over lands moistened by irrigation, for damp air offers less opposition than dry air. Upon encountering the grazing lands of Nebraska, the storm was checked. It tried to push its way through the dry clear air, and in the struggle developed a mighty power. The whirling winds increased to hurricane speed. The rain which had been light, fell in torrents over an area of thousands of square The cyclone was beaten. lingered on the northern border of Colorado and Kansas for 24 hours, battling with the dry atmosphere south. It was pushed slowly due east till it centered at Omaha on Friday, when it gave up the contest, turned sharply north, and ran off to the great lakes, where it found all the moisture it wanted. But though the cyclone was conquered in the struggle it de-veloped a mighty strength. It broadened and increased its whirling speed hourly until its intensity became something remarkable. Then it was that the spitefu little tornadoes formed on its south and east and made devastation in the States which had refused admission to the cyclone. A tornado resembles a cyclone in some respects, being also a whirling storm ground, and narrows to a point below like

waterspout at sea. The whirling speed of the wind at this inverted apex has never been determined, but it may equal 500 or 600 miles an hour. In addition to nado has a rapid forward motion, which is Violette, a French chanceuse, who sings the new absurdity, "Ta-ra-ra Boom-de-ay."


