BRITAIN SCORES ANOTHER.

A Fine Addition to Her Vast Domain--Triumph for Rhodes.

CAPE Town, April 7 .- The annexation of Pondoland has been effected without firing a shot. The chiefs and people of the newly annexed country are quietly submitting. This is another triumph for the so-called imperial policy of the Hon. Ceeil Rhodes, the Premier of Cape Colony, and is a most important addition to the British domain in South Africa. For eight years past Pondoland has been under an alleged protectorate which was the cause of considerable friction. The country just annexed is described as being one of the most delightful regions in the world, though it has been the scene of considerable lawlessness and many fierce tribal fights. Pondoland has an area of about 3,900 square miles and a native population of about 200,000. The white population is very small.

STEAD'S BOOK.

News Companies Object to the Directory of Chicago's Besorts.

NEW YORK, April 8. - The American and Union news companies have refused to handle W. T. Stead's book, "If Christ Came to Chicago," and have notified their dealers to cancel all orders sent to the publishers in Chicago. "We have refused to sell the book," said the manager of the Union News Company, "because we do not think it proper. In the first place, the title of the book is decidedly objectionable. We look upon it as little short of blasphemous and good people in all parts of the country by thousands agree with us. It seems to us as if the title had been selected merely for the purpose of attracting attention and not because of any special aplication to the subject matter of the book. Another objection is that it not only gives the names of the keepers, but addresses of all the disreputable resorts in Chicago are given, making the volume, among other things, a directory of sin. To attempt to conceal it by a mass of other matter is merely beating about the bush. It is not proper reading to go into a family, and the reputation of the author does not palliate the offense in any way in our opinion. Again, we object to being parties to besmirching people who bappen to own houses in which dives are located. In Mr. Stead's book very many good people who are innocent of any real offense are held up to public gaze as owners of questionable houses. Many of them had their property in the hands of agents and knew nothing at all about the nature of their tenants. There is nothing to be gained by exposing them. We are opposed to any such method of proceeding."


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
