If factorymen would view the matter in the right light they would abstain from making a box of inferior tough-textured hay cheese, for the reason that the temporary gain that may be made on the comparatively few cheese they turn out before the full cream grass goods come in, is far more than by the injury inflicted on the whole season's make, by shipping lot of inferior early cheese to the other side, where they are sold as Canadia; pression as to the bulk of the season make to follow. It is the very acme folly for our farmers and factorymer to run the risk of losing thousands of dollars on the great bulk of their out put for the sake of a few paltry gains on their fodder.—Trade Bulletin. SALE OF 1895 CHEESE.

Several hundred boxes of well-kept cold storage cheese of 1895 make have been sold in this city of late at 11 1-2c, and 13c. One lot of 200 boxes at 1-2c was shipped to the English market, and it is thought that they may be sold by this time. The other sales at 12c to 13c were for the local trade. But this demonstrates very forcibly the great value of cold storage properly applied, in preserving per shable goods. Here we have instance of the quality of cheese being fairly well kept for over a year, 200 boxes of which brought 11 1-2c just before it was taken out of the stone for shipment. No better proof than this need be adduced to show the great importof refrigeration for preserving goods that would otherwis ome worthless.-Montreal Trade | work.
