

ANOTHER CANADIAN FORCE. Toronto, March 20.-Major Hamilton Merritt, second in command of the Governor-General's Body Guards, who served in Brabant's Horse during the earlier part of the war, and who returned to Canada a few weeks ago, has caused it to be announced that, subject to the consent of the Canadian government, the war office has accepted his offer to raise a mounted regiment of 600 men for service in South Africa. The preliminary arrangements as made between Major Merritt and the war office provided that the Dominion government should make arrangements for recruiting and should attend to the fitting out of the regiment, the war office undertaking to recoup the Canadian exchequer. Another feature was that Major Merritt should nominate the officers of the regiment. Major Merritt is at present in New York on private business, but will return very soon and resume consideration of the matter with the gov-
