Trade With Trinidad.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—General Agent Trapp, of Trinidad, says there was great regret at the wreck of the Orizoco of the Pickford & Black line, as that steamer was the first to carry fresh meat from Canada, and considerable interest attached to the experiment. The meat had arrived in excellent condition, and the principal importer had been sufficiently satisfied to repeat his order. At the same time he was of opinion that the cold-storage accommodation was insufficient, and that with an increased accommodation more business would be done. There is a very hopeful prospect for the dead meat, vegetable and fruit trade.

STOLE \$1,000,000!

How a Clever New York Operator Swindled More Than 1,000 Business Men.

New York, Nov. 29.—Operating under names similar to those of firms with high commercial ratings, Henry Seelig, whose arrest here has been chronicled, has swindled the shrewdest business men in America.

Some of them have again and again fallen his victims, their repeated mistakes being the result of his rapidity of movements and the easy manner in which he changed names. Four years ago, as "B. Blank," he did business in this city, obtaining goods worth more than half a million dollars, which he disposed of for what he could get, making no returns to his victims.

Later Seelig operated successfully in Brooklyn, and still later in several of the larger cities in the west. Capt. McCusky believes that he or his confederates are even now running a swindle with headquarters in Chicago. When arrested Seelig was well dressed, and had in his possession a considerable sum of money.

While operating as "B. Blank," at 29 Murray street, he was commonly identified as Berthold Blank, of 344 Greenwich street, whose credit was of a high order. Seelig sent letters broadcast over the country, asking for prices, samples and discounts. He was not in the least particular as to the kind of goods he dealt in. Anything that could be disposed of quickly at a sacrifice was grist in his mill. His first letter

to a prospective victim was generally worded like this:

"Please quote lowest price on goods, sending at once small sample and naming best rate of discount for cash."

This invariably brought a reply. Then followed a correspondence covering perhaps a fortnight. Seelig being too shrewd to appear over-anxious. Finally an order was given, and as soon as the shipment reached the city it was disposed of. Sometimes the goods were sold at auction and at other times they went to wholesalers or retailers who were satisfied not to ask questions so long as they drove an advantageous bargain.

After the discovery of the "B. Blank" swindle, Seelig and his pals were arrested. They gave bail, crossed to Brooklyn and began the same kind of business there. There, too, they were detected, and six indictments were found against Seelig in King's county. He was arrested, pleaded not guilty, furnished bail in the sum of \$5,000, and again he disappeared. Later the New York police received a tantalizing note from the swindler, who sarcastically congratulated them upon their acuteness and alertness.

The police have records which show that he has operated as "B. Blank," Crossman & Co., "The Grain and Packing Commission Company," and "The American and Transatlantic Trading Company." It is figured that Seelig's stealings altogether would total \$1,000,000.

NOW TURKEY TALKS OF WAR.

Cruiser Kentucky's Arrival at Smyrna an Hostile Act.

But a Compromise is Likely—Kruger Seeing the Parisian Sights—English High Churchman Wants to Use Edward VI.'s Prayer Book—Big Men in a Big Gold Mine Trust.

London, Nov. 29.—The Vienna Tageblatt publishes a dispatch from Constantinople to the effect that the Turkish council of ministers have held a conference to determine whether or not the sending of the United States battleship Kentucky to Smyrna should be regarded as an act of hostility. According to the Tageblatt's dispatch the home minister urged the severance of diplomatic relations with the United States, and even went so far as to threaten war unless the Kentucky should be withdrawn from Turkish waters. The ministers express the belief that the European powers would not permit the United States to attack Turkey, and that that country, therefore, would be safe in taking a defiant attitude.

At Ferrouh Bey, Turkish minister at Washington, after a call on Secretary Hay relative to the visit of the big battleship Kentucky to Turkish waters, declared that the Kentucky's visit conveyed no menace, and that it had no bearing upon the diplomatic relations between the Turkish Government and the United States. Meanwhile it is understood that the negotiations between Mr. Grieson, United States charge d'affaires at Constantinople, and the ports, for the settlement of the missionary claims and the question as to Dr. Norton's exequatur as consul at Harpoot, are progressing with indications that a compromise will be arranged.

ADVOCATE ANCIENT RITES.
London, Nov. 29.—The proceedings of the Round Table conference summoned by the Bishop of London for the discussion of burning questions agitating the English Church, has been published in authentic form. Lord Halifax and Canon Gore, High Church leaders, offer to accept the first Prayer Book of Edward VI. as an alternative in the communion service and to dissolve the English Church Union, a high church body which has excited the hostility of the low churchmen. The impression is strengthened that the only effective peace conference will be an enlarged conference at Constantinople, and the ports, for the settlement of the missionary claims and the question as to Dr. Norton's exequatur as consul at Harpoot, are progressing with indications that a compromise will be arranged.

BIG LEGACY DUES.
The lord chief justice's court is occupied at present with determining whether or not the late William L. Winans, formerly of Baltimore, Md., was a domiciled resident of Britain when he died in 1897. The crown claimed a legacy on the whole of Winans's millions.

CANADIANS HEARTILY WELCOMED

Arrival of the R. C. I. Contingent in Old London.

The Brave Fellows Everywhere Greeted With Tumultuous Applause.

French Deputies Vote Sympathy With Mr. Kruger—British Beer-Poisoning Disease Spreads.

London, Nov. 29.—A detachment of 260 men, belonging to the Royal Canadian Regiment, Col. Otter, commanding, which have just reached England from South Africa by the Hawarden Castle, arrived in London today, and proceeded to Kensington Barracks. Since their arrival at Southampton, where they were welcomed by Major-General Robert MacGregor Stewart, the Canadians have been greeted everywhere with tumultuous applause.

Gen. Stewart made a brief speech to the Canadians, during which he said Englishmen rejoiced at their bravery and deeds just as much as they rejoiced over the honors achieved by the home troops and their kinsmen from all the colonies brought together by the war.

Col. Otter expressed his thanks for the sympathetic utterances, and the Canadians took the train for London.

SYMPATHY FOR KRUGER.
Paris, Nov. 29.—The Chamber of Deputies today unanimously adopted a vote of sympathy with Mr. Kruger.

THANKSGIVING IN MANILA.
Manila, Nov. 29.—Thanksgiving services were held here today in the Philippine theater and in some of the Catholic churches.

THE CZAR BRACING UP.
Livadia, European Russia, Nov. 29.—The strength of the czar is improving. His physicians issued the following bulletin this morning:

"The czar passed a good day yesterday. He slept about one hour. At 4 in the evening his temperature was 97.5; pulse 68. He slept very well during the night, and felt more cheerful this morning. His strength is increasing. At 9 o'clock this morning his temperature was 97.2; pulse 60."
