THE STORY OF MURRAY HALL

Prominent Tammany Politician

Was a Woman.

No One Aware of the Fact Until Her Death-Had a Wife and "Got Full' With the Boys.

New York, Jan. 19 .- Yesterday's Sun contains the following remarkable

It was discovered yesterday that one of Barney Martin's good Tammany men, an old-time voter and member of the Iroquois Club, was a woman. Dr. William C. Gallagher, of 302 West Twelfth street, walked into the coroner's office in the afternoon and reported the death of Murray H. Hall, professional bondsman, politician and all-round sport. Hall lived at 145 Sixth avenue and kept an employment bur-Tammany Association of the Fifth Asdistrict; had lived for thirty years in Sixth avenue, Jefferson market near court, and was well known to every politician on the west side of the city. Coroner E. W. Hart was trained in politics on the west side and consequently was well acquainted with Hall. It was because of this that Dr. Gallagher reported Hall's death to Coroner Hart instead of going to Coroner Zucca, in whose district Hall died.

"It is a wonderful case," continued the physician, "a remarkable case. Although I know she died from cancer of the breast I am puzzled so that I don't know what to do about issuing a death certificate for her."

He told Dr. Gallagher as much, adding that Hall had always voted at the district primaries, got full with the boys, and for a quarter of a century had voted in the

"Her," replied the coroner, "I thought

"Well, he's a woman," said the doc-"although I did not discover it until after he died. As I treated him as a man and he died a woman I didn't know what sex to write in the death certificate. Dr. Gaffagher was led back to Clerk Reynold's office and there explained that Hall had been treated, medically speaking, as a man, but was discovered after death to be a normal woman. Clerk Reynolds read over the law gov-erning cases that should be reported

to the corner. It stated specifically that it was the duty of any citizen to report the death of "a person who shall have died in any suspicious or unusual menner." He concluded that as Murray Hall had for over 30 years been known as a man and had died a woman he had died in an "unusual manner." After the history of the case has been further discussed, Dr. Gallagher was told that it certainly was a coroner's case, for the additional reason that he had been treating Murray Hall for cancer of the left breast, believing Hall to be a man. DEATH OF MURRAY HALL'S WIFE Late in the day Clerk Reynolds was informed that Murray Hall was a widower, and that his wife died over two years ago. The death of the wife is on record at the health board. She is described as Mrs. C. L. Hail, 58 years old, wife of Murray H. Hall. The date
