MR. COOK'S SILVER

Thief Threw It Overboard in Toronto Bay Stole It Two Weeks Ago.

Toronto, Aug. 22.-There is lying at the bottom of the lake, just outside of the eastern gap, a valise containing a lot of silverware, which was stolen about two weeks ago from the home of H. H. Cook, in Parkdale, and which was to have been put in as exhibits at the police court in the case of Harry Maddeson, of New York city, charged with the burglary. Maddeson was arrested almost a week ago at Niagara Falls, Ont., on suspicion, and when brought to the station the silverware was found in his possession. Inspector Stark was notified of the capture and the recovery of the stolen property, and yesterday Detective Slemin left to bring the prisoner back to Toronto for trial. On the journey to this city, by the steamer Corona, Maddeson was handcuffed to the officer. When the boat approached the eastern gap the prisoner suddenly jumped from his seat and struck the officer in the face. Slemin, however, floored his man, and, after giving him some advice, told him to get on his feet. No sooner had Maddeson done so than he seized the valise containing the silverware and hurled it overboard into the water. Maddeson was locked up at the Agnes street station.

DEATH DEALING STORMS PREVALENT

Waterspout and Tornado Do Great Damage -Several Lives Lost.

Hossick Falls, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Destructive storms in Berkshire county, Lower Vermont, and in Eastern New York, which began yesterday afternoon, culminated in a disastrous cloudburst last night. A bridge is gone at Pownal, Vt., and people are forced to keep in houses by the depth of water in the streets. The wreck-age force of the Boston and Maine Railroad is repairing washouts in the vicinity. North Adams suffered great loss from the cloudburst. The damage there is estimated at half a million dollars. Loss of life is reported. a man named Fitzpatrick having been drowned while trying to rescue a horse from the flood. The rainfall continues today.

TORNADO IN OKLAHOMA. Anadarko, Ok., Aug. 22.-Further details of the tornado which struck this city last night, indicate that the storm was severe in the country districts, where several persons were killed and injured and many buildings destroyed. The loss in crops and live stock will be heavy. One report says that four persons were killed at a farm house a few miles distant.

NATIONAL NEGRO BUSINESS LEAGUE

Declares the Proceedings at Pierce City, as Acts of Madness.

Chicago, Aug. 22 .- Delegates to the second annual convention of the National Negro Business League, which is in session in Handel Hall, declares the lynching at Pierce City, Mo., an act of madness, an atrocity. The fact that within a few hundred miles of Chicago the citizens of a town had proclaimed that no negro will be permitted hereafter to live or spend night in the village astonished the

delegates. Booker T. Washington, president of the league and leader of the convention would not talk about the affair. He said it would be too difficult to express himself so that he would not be misunderstood.

MOTORMAN MOBBED'

In New York-His Car Killed a Little Girl -Police Came to His Rescue.

New York, Aug. 22.-A determined effort was made by a mob last night to lynch Julius Seibel, a motorman, because his car had killed Annie Emery, 9 years old, on Madison avenue. The car was coming down a steep grade when the child tried to cross, became frightened and hesi-tated, standing in the middle of the track. The little girl was thrown under the wheels and her head crushed. People immediately swarmed about the place, women and children shrieking. The cry, "Lynch him!" was raised by the men, and a concerted attack was made on the motorman, who defended himself manfully with his back to the car. He was bruised and badly beaten before a squad of police rescu ed him, beating the crowd back with their clubs. He was arrested.

100 PERSONS

Disastrous Results of an Oil Blaze in Philadelphia.

The Conflagration Covers Two Entire Blocks-Loss \$300,000 to \$400,000.

Philadelphia, Aug. 21.—By the collapse of a burning oil tank this afternoon at the Atlantic Refining Company's plant at Point Breeze, where a fire has been raging since Monday afternoon, about a hundred persons, firemen, employes of the company, and spectators, were more or less seand spectators, were more or less severely burned. Most of the cases were treated on the ground by ambulance surgeons, but a few of them were considered sufficiently serious to necessitate the removal of the vic-

tims to the hospital. Dykes were hastily thrown up by the firemen and employes of the com-pany, and the blazing fluid was confined to an area of about two blocks on Passyunk avenue.
