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OTHER MINISTERS MAY STEP OUT

Lord Balfour of Burleigh Expected to Leave Cabinet.
THE CONSERVATIVES SURPRISED
At the Resignations—Comment of the London Press—Lord Rothschild's Opinion.

London, Sept. 18.—It is understood that the resignations of some other members of the cabinet are imminent, and that Lord Balfour of Burleigh, secretary for Scotland, has actually resigned. Lord Lansdowne, the foreign secretary, left London last night for Balmoral, whither Premier Balfour and his brother are also expected to proceed immediately.

In the Conservative clubs last night the manner in which the crisis was projected was almost as great a surprise as in the Liberal quarters. Curiosity centers on the attitude of the Duke of Devonshire, whose resignation has been fully expected.

Political prospects are already busy appointing Austen Chamberlain chancellor of the exchequer, the Earl of Selborne as secretary for the colonies, etc., because it is recognized as impossible that an appeal to the country can be much longer delayed.

The Morning Post says that Mr. Chamberlain by his resignation, which the King was graciously pleased to accept, has crossed the rubicon. That was but a little stream, but to cross it had an immense significance.

London, Sept. 18.—Lord Rothschild was interviewed today as to the probable effect on the empire, and especially on the national finances, of Mr. Chamberlain's resignation. He said that if the Duke of Devonshire, lord president of the council, had also resigned, and Mr. Balfour had not put his policy before the country, Mr. Chamberlain's resignation might have been serious. "Why should not Mr. Chamberlain resign in every part of the world? He cannot go on campaigning for it and remain in the cabinet. Therefore, if he continues to want the job, he must work for it outside."

Salisbury's Will.
London, Sept. 18.—The probating of Lord Salisbury's will shows that he left an estate valued at \$1,551,680. No public bequests were made.

Better News From the Storm-Swept Districts.
Winnipeg, Sept. 18.—The latest news from the country concerning the crops, as received from correspondents, is reassuring after the reports of great damage which it was feared the storm of last Saturday had entailed. The latest advices, however, tend to relieve the anxiety, as they are generally very hopeful, and indicate a minimum of damage. Threshing will be greatly delayed generally, but the fine weather that has prevailed since will prove the salvation of the country.

Jack Fitzgerald, a well-known pugilist of the Crown's Nest Pass, has been arrested, and is held for trial as one of the results of a stabbing affair, in which he is charged with wounding James Miller, who will probably die.
