LOCAL MARKET.

London, Saturday, Oct. 3.—The market today was pretty near as large as last Saturday, which was considered one of the largest so far this fall. While there was not as many potatoes offered today as a week ago, the section of the market, which is allotted to those who have vegetables was a conspicuous feature of today's business. Prices as a rule were not as strong as last Saturday.

Grain—Oats were in large supply at \$1 to \$1.75 per cwt. according to quality. Wheat, steady, at 90c per bushel. A load of barley sold at \$1.12 per cwt. and a load of peas at 70c per bushel.

Butter and Eggs—Butter sold quickly, as the supply was not very large. Sales were made at 22c and 23c per pound for butter in crocks, and 23c to 24c for pound rolls; wholesale, eggs were decidedly firm at 22c to 23c for crate and basket lots; by the single dozen, 25c was paid.

Poultry—There was a large representation in this line. Prices were firm. Old fowl sold at 6c to 7c per pound alive, or 8c dressed. Ducks, 8c to 9c per pound alive, or 10c to 11c dressed. Dressed ducks sold at 10c to 12c per pound, the latter price being paid for extra fine quality.

Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes were again well represented today. Sales were slow, as most people are of the opinion that it is too early to buy for winter use. Prices ranged from 70c to 80c per bag by the load. Quite a few sales were made at 75c while a single bag was sold at 85c to 90c. Tomatoes at 15c and 20c per basket. Cabbages, 40c per bushel. Celery sold well at 25c to 40c per dozen. Onions, 7c per bushel for large ones or 5c to 6c per quart for picklers. Lettuce, radishes, beets and sage, 15c to 20c per dozen.

Fruits—Pears sold at 60c to 90c per bushel. Apples, 15c to 20c per bushel. Peaches, 50c to 75c per bushel. Apples plentiful and slow at 30c to 50c per bushel. Canned apples, 15c to 20c per bushel. Quinces, 15c to 20c per bushel. 40c to 50c per bushel. Chestnuts were much cheaper, as last Saturday they sold at 5c per bushel, while today they were disposed of at 3c to 4c per bushel. Citrons sold at 50c to 70c each. Baked Hogs—Prices steady at 9c per cwt. Prices will likely go lower.

Live Hogs—Prices for Monday will be 15c to 16c per cwt. on 90c less than last week. Small pigs sold today at 45c to 50c per pair.

Butchers' Meat—Beef went at 35c and 36c per cwt. for a good class. Veal sold at 30c and 35c per cwt. Lamb, easier at 10c per pound by the carcass.

It was decided to recommend to next year's council that all city debentures be validated by the Ontario railway commission.

Ald. Beattie announced that it would soon be necessary to sell some debentures, as the city needed money. There are at present the sum of \$33,500 ready to be disposed of as follows: School debentures \$49,500, fire halls \$19,000, waterworks \$15,000. It was decided to recommend that these debentures be advertised.

Closing of Bathurst Street.
The city solicitor's opinion on the closing of Bathurst street was read. He recommended that the city take no part in the matter, as it was a question for the Grand Trunk and the street railway to settle between themselves.

The application of R. E. Simmons, of East London, for a veteran's gold watch had been referred to Ald. Parsons to report on. He informed the committee that Simmons had served on the second contingent in South Africa, but when the watches were being given the soldiers he was in the Northwest, and so did not receive one. Ald. Parsons recommended that the matter be laid over until the papers arrive from headquarters. This was agreed to.

Case of Joseph Smith.
Rev. Canon Hague wrote asking that the council do something for Mrs. Knight, with whom Mr. Joseph Smith, the consumptive, had boarded. Mr. Hague pointed out that Mrs. Knight had been put to considerable expense in keeping the man and had to destroy the bedding and other articles. Her boarders had left as soon as the condition of Smith was known, causing her a considerable loss of money. The matter was referred to Inspector McColligan to report on.

Complaint was made that the rental of Mr. Armstrong for one of the stores in the East End Hall was not high enough, and gave him an advantage over others in the same business in that section of the city. Mr. Armstrong at present pays \$5 a month, and it was decided to raise the rental to \$10 a month. The Conservative Club rental was also recommended to be raised to \$10 per month.

City Treasurer's Salary.
The salary of the city treasurer was fixed at \$1,400, which is \$200 less than the sum received by the late City Treasurer Pope.

Those present were Ald. Beattie (chairman), Ald. Ferguson, Ald. Parsons, Mayor Stevely and Secretary Bell.

UNCLE SAM STILL FIGHTING MOROS

Manila, Oct. 3.—A belated report received today from the Island of Mindanao tells of a battle between scouts and a dozen casualties occurred. An up-country company of scouts was attacked on Kethley road by a band of 50 Moros. In the first sudden onslaught one of the scouts was killed, and two were wounded. The company rallied, however, driving off the superior force with a loss of nine natives killed and several wounded.

STRICTER RULES AT UNIVERSITY

Over the Registration—Students Must Show They Are Qualified.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Toronto University re-opened yesterday morning for another eight months, and the registration which has been going on steadily for the past two weeks came with a rush that fairly swamped Registrar Brebnar and his staff of assistants.

Students from all parts of Canada and the United States, and even other countries, all seemed to want to register at once. The crush was greatest at University College, and the School of Practical Science, as over the third the number of students on the rolls will be registered at these two colleges.

Many to Come Later.
Despite the very apparent crowding, the registration up to noon has not been as heavy this year as last on account of the lateness of the week. Last year the opening was on Tuesday, and very few people missed the first week, but this year there will be a large percentage of the students who won't come to the city till Monday.

University College was the scene of the greatest jam and it finally became so congested there that Brebnar admitted about thirty students into his office, locked the doors and stationed a policeman on guard to keep the rest of the throng out. Then when these thirty had been attended, another score and a half were admitted. Mr. Brebnar could make no exact comparison between this year's registration and last year's.

Stricter Rules.
"There are new conditions this year. Every first year student has to come to us first, present all his previous certificates and satisfy us that he can carry his course before we allow him to enter. Previously, almost any person could register in the first year, but the rule this year is much stricter. We have had to turn down quite a number on account of the insufficiency of their qualifications."

There have been several registrations in the faculty of forestry already, and it is expected that there will be fifteen or twenty in the infant faculty. President Palmer will probably be in the faculty of education, where there will in all likelihood be between two and three hundred.

McMaster opened a week ago and has got settled down to lectures by this time. Trinity, Dental College, Knox, Wyckoff and the Medical School, all report heavy registration, although not quite up to last year. This, however, will be remedied by Monday's influx. Victoria's registration is less than a hundred so far, and most of them are in the first year.

Lafayette was the only man who would give figures this morning, and he reports as follows up to noon today: First year, 190; second year, 172; third year, 104; fourth year, 32.

Chancellor Burwash gave his usual opening address to the Victoria students in the chapel at 10:30 this morning. President Palmer will address the students of all faculties and colleges in convocation hall at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Lectures will not commence in either arts, medicine or applied science till next Monday.

RURAL PHONES COST BUT TRIFLE
Aylmer Paper Points Out What Is Being Done in That District.

Aylmer Express: No better idea of what a rural telephone system means to a town can be gained than by a glance over the new directory just issued by the South Malahide and Bayham Telephone Companies. There are almost 600 names of 'phone holders on the list, which can be reached at any time, day or night, through the central exchange office in Aylmer. Of this number, 71 are located in business places, and private houses in Aylmer, each with its own private wire, so that there is no ringing of bells except when individually wanted. There is hardly a business or professional man of any kind that cannot be reached by any of the farmers. Free lines at the country in any direction that is not reached by the other sections through the central office here, as the different lines reach out for 10, 15 and 20 miles in every direction, like the spokes of a wheel. After the first installation of a phone, the cost to subscribers is only \$2 a year. If anyone wants anything better or cheaper than this, we do not know where they are going to get it.

Secretary's Report.
Mr. J. F. Craik, of Crampton, secretary, presented his report, which showed that the schools are prospering. The following is a summary: Number of schools 15, number of teachers and officers 125, number of scholars 449, average attendance of teachers and officers 85, average attendance of scholars 544, total average attendance 682, amount contributed towards missions \$210.29.

FATAL CRASH OF AUTO AND A STREET CAR

Chicago, Oct. 3.—An automobile racing at a rate of forty miles an hour, and a train on the Chicago and Milwaukee Electric Railway running at even a higher rate of speed, collided at the Burlington road crossing a mile north of Kenosha, Wis., yesterday. As a result George O. Field, a prominent man of Manitowish, Mich., was killed, and the automobile reduced to a pile of scrap iron. The accident was witnessed by a large number of passengers on the electric train, and while all of them were badly shaken up, none was injured.

POLITICAL GOSSIP

Under the heading "Bowler Abroad" the New Westminster Gazette says: "According to press dispatches, Attorney-General Bowser, in speaking at Toronto on Wednesday, took as his theme the Japanese question. We have not the full text of his speech, but knowing him as we do in this province, we are afraid his memory did not serve him well enough for him to tell his audience how he had prepared a contract with one Gotah, Japanese by birth, as one party, and R. Marpole, the then general superintendent of the Pacific division of the Canadian Pacific Railway, or the other party, by which Gotah was to evade the Japanese ports and prevent the Government of Japan adhering strictly to the agreement entered into with the Government with respect to the removal of Japanese immigration to this country. He, of course, forgot to tell the good people of Toronto that the Japanese were to be shipped to Honolulu and thence to British Columbia ports, and that when he was making the howl about the influx of these Orientals his firm was in possession of the funds for preparing the agreement which made the influx possible. He knew the route, and raised no warning sound, and because he thought it would never reach the surface that he had been a party to their coming he was loud in his protestations against the Liberal Government for preventing her sons from coming to our shores."

Members of the Labor party in Kingston have been talking of bringing out a candidate for the Federal House, but prominent workers state there is little chance of such action.

Mr. D. R. Ross, of Embro, member of the county council, and a Liberal of long standing, will, it is said, permit his name to go before the Liberal convention for North Oxford in Woodstock next Tuesday. Friends of Mr. Ross are predicting that he will be a factor in the convention.

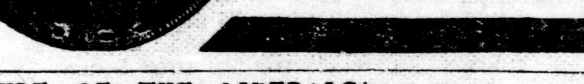

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THE RULE OF THE LIBERALS

(Continued from Page One.)

he said, an address which expressed all the Conservative party had to say. Hon. A. G. MacKay, who was loudly cheered, remarked that Nova Scotia had perhaps given more than her fair share of public men to this country. He did not know of a better man, a cleaner man, nor a greater statesman than Hon. Mr. Fielding. The financial critic of the Opposition had stated that Mr. Telford had been a mere automation, voting at the beck and call of his leader. Notwithstanding that Mr. MacKay would have a man vote correctly, he observed that Mr. Telford had been a worker, and in this connection he pointed to numerous public works in the constituency obtained by Mr. Telford. The election throughout Ontario was not a bitter one, said Mr. MacKay. The Province seemed to realize that the present Government had done its work well, and there were no large issues. The Opposition, he claimed, had not done its work well or else it perhaps would have raised an issue. Mr. MacKay added that he knew no man who could be more faithful to his departmental duties than Mr. Telford or a man more tenacious in the work he had undertaken.

"I am surprised to hear that our Conservative friends have referred to Mr. Telford as an automation," began Mr. Fielding, and then much to the amusement of the audience he pictured the Parliament of Canada if every member had taken up about 600 pages of Hansard. How grateful, he said, the public should be that there were many men in the House who did not talk as much as Mr. Foster. In Parliament there was needed a combination of the wisdom of age with the enthusiasm of youth. He congratulated North Grey Liberals upon their choice of a candidate.

Coming to questions of more general importance, Mr. Fielding once more made the ringing statement: "We have given you twelve years of good government, not perfect government, not angelic government, but just good, human government." He occupied some time in refuting scandalous tales, showing how no charge had been made against any member of the present cabinet. All the scandal, he said, when aggregated, was very little when viewed in its proper proportion. The Conservatives, he commented, took their "ounce of soap and manufactured it into the proverbial hoghead of lather," yet he thought the general public viewed things in their proper proportion.

Increase in Trade.
Proceeding, he launched into the trade question, and showed how the increase in trade under the Conservatives had been \$3,500,000 a year. In his most courteous manner Mr. Fielding desired to "ask with all due modesty that the public take notice of the fact that under the Liberal Administration the trade increase had amounted to \$34,000,000 a year." Referring to finances, the speaker stated that Mr. Foster had raised his pessimistic voice in the Commons so often and for so many sessions that there was not a human soul in the Dominion who took his cry seriously.

Decreased Taxation.
To the applause of the entire audience Mr. Fielding told of Conservative and Liberal surpluses, and to this argument for support he showed that the rate of taxation had been reduced two dollars on a hundred dollars by the Liberals. Completing the same line of thought, he said the Liberals had saved \$54,000,000 to the people of Canada by this decrease. Mr. Foster, of course, he said, did not care for such a line of argument, because that gentleman was showing how the per capita tax had been increased. In this connection Mr. Fielding repeated the little joke perpetrated at Massey Hall, reading from a book showing how dealings with a per capita tax was a clumsy method. That statement was made by an "eminent authority on political economy," and that authority was no other than Hon. George E. Foster.

Rural Mail Delivery.
The speaker went on to tell of the postoffice department, and its new scheme of rural mail delivery. The Conservatives, he said, talked of rural mail delivery, but they had not been able to even provide a two-cent postage rate. "The story of the administration of the postoffice department,"

he added, "is one of progress, economy and prosperity, and one which above entitled the Government to ask for a continuance of power by the people." (Cheers.)

Proceeding, he told of larger expenditures for immigration purposes, and commented on this to the effect that nothing had ever done so much good for the country as its vigorous immigration policy. Railways had been aided during the last twelve years to the extent of \$20,000,000, while the Conservatives had spent \$480,000,000 for railways, if the land given away in subsidies was valued at \$15 per acre, which was the valuation set by Mr. Ames of magic lantern fame. Again he admitted that the G. T. P. would cost more than at first anticipated, but he said a cheap railway was a bad railway. "It is worth remembering," he said, "that no matter what that road costs, Canada's contribution is seven years' interest on the eastern section, and seven years' interest on the mountain section. Seven years' interest on these two sections of the road is all that Canada pays on that road. After that seven years the G. T. P. Company pays 3 per cent interest. The burden is not on the people of Canada, but on the G. T. P., which will look sharply after that road to see that it does not cost more than it should." Continuing, the speaker drew a comparison between the big land subsidy to the C. P. R. and the exemptions to the same company, and the bargain with the G. T. P. Again he took up the Crow's Nest controversy along the same lines as in his Massey Hall speech. In this connection he said Mr. Borden had raised his club to the Liberal Government and unintentionally had smashed the brains out of Edmund B. Osler, M. P. (Applause.)

BANQUET TO THE TEAM

Lord Strathcona Has Also Invited Them to Glenora.

London, Oct. 3.—The Canadian lacrosse team will be banqueted on Oct. 20 at King's Hall, Holborn restaurant. Some 500 people are expected to be present. They will be entertained also at Manchester Oct. 28. Lord Strathcona has invited the team to visit Glenora.

CURLING RINK GUTTED.
