## CHAMPLAIN TERCENTENRAY

Commission Sets Date for the Great Celebration Next Summer.

Montpelier, Vt., Nov. 13 .- The commis-Sions representing the States of Vermont and New York, in arranging for the celebration of the tercentennial anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain and the surrounding territory, now forming part of the two states and of the Province of Quebec, have decided upon the dates on which the observance will be held. The opening day's celebration, Sunday, July 4, have been arranged to consist largely of religious services, and will be general throughout New York, Vermont and Quebec. On Monday, the real opening day of the observance, Crown Point, N. Y., will be the headquarters; on Tuesday, Ticonderoga, N. Y., and on Wednesday, Platisburg will be the scenes of the closing celebrations in New York State. Shifting into Vermont on Thursday, the main observances of that day will be held in Burlington, and the celebration will be continued on Isle La Motte on Friday. Saturday, like the opening day, will be featured in general observances.



### Pro!. Barnes Traces Movements of Civilization Through Several Centuries

St. Andrew's Hall was well filled last night when Professor Earl Barnes gave the fifth of his series of lectures on "The History of Civilization," delivered under the auspices of the London Froebel Society. His subject for the evening was "Monarchy and Democracy."

Prof. Barnes first gave a short resume of his course of lectures, showing how the advance of the world had been marked off into definite cycles in which civilization advanced along one definite line. He showed how in each age this was the case. There was no universal development, each period stretching out like a tentacle in some particular line. It was an age of great personalities, or the personalities were lost and it became an age of culture; or again, they were forgotten for the time, and ecclesiasticism became the noun of life; later, it changed to a bases of politics, when everything becomes subordinated to this conception.

What 1870 Did. Using the statement of the Hon. James Bryce that a hundred years hence, 1870, would be considered the greatest date in human history, the speaker went on to show how from tea biscuits than any q that date throughout the world the democratic principle began to spell ruin to the principle of absolute monarchism. It became the age of politics. That date saw the final unification of the kingdom of Italy; the unification of the petty German states into a great empire, and republicanism adopted in France. The period, too, marked the rise of the idea of state education in England. Michigan and Cornell Universities threw open their doors for the higher education of women, and trade unionism became a factor in life and capital became organized.

All Is Changed.

Now the great rulers and statesmen and jurists have sunk into the background, and it is such names as Rockefeller, Morgan, Schwab, the captains of industry, who have come to


