That was the statement made by Assessment Commissioner Grant who returned last evening from Toronto, where he has been attending the sessions of the committee. "It must be borne in mind that there were no changes made," said Mr. Grant. "Several proposals were made. said Mr. and it is probable that some of them will be accepted.

Exemptions on Income.

I opposed the change, as I did not consider it fair to the small property-owner and the workingman. Very sider it fair to the small property owner and the workingman. Very few laborers or mechanics make that amount of salary, and in consequence the small propety-ewner would have to make up the difference in the exemptions. However, the recommendation was sent on to the Government. The exemptions from income tax of single men remain the same as be-fore, \$400 and \$600."

Taxing Educational Institutions. "What effect will the recommendation that all education institutions run for gain, shall be taxed, have upon London?" was askd.

"It will affect us very little, if any," said Mr. Grant: "There are one or two institutions, no more, that will be affected. One of them is the medical school, and I am not quite certain that it will apply to that. Some business colleges will be affected, but in London they pay their fair share of the taxes, and will not. There are many other institutions, but I do not think they will be affected.

MISS NIX CONTRADICTED

Foreman of Jury Says He Saw Her With Accused Since the Fire.

Uxbridge, Nov. 25. - Archie Mc-Lachlan, the young man whom a coroner's jury yesterday accused of murdering his wife and two baby boys, was this afternoon sent on for trial by Magistrate Hamilton on the charge of wife-murder. Wm. Foster, the foreman of Coroner

Bascom's jury, was a witness this afternoon. He swore that he saw Mc-Lachlan and Miss Nix together on some date later than Oct. 20. The meeting between them was in the door of Miss Nix's home. Asked to further recall the date, said it was Oct. 23 or 25.

Miss Nix stated yesterday that she nad not seen McLachlan since the fire or three weeks before the fire. The prisoner had another attack of weeping this afternoon. The cause of it was a photo of his dead wife reproduced in a Toronto paper. It had been ipped out, and as he sat looking at it ne tears began to flow, and they connued flowing for some time.
