

HAMILTON WOMAN SLAIN BY HER ENRAGED HUSBAND

Shot to Death in Home of Friend Where She Was a Visitor—
Another's Alleged Attentions Said to Have Been
the Cause of the Desperate Act.

Hamilton, Jan. 30.—A brick cottage at 48 Bay street north, occupied by Mrs. A. Duffey, was the scene of a murder at 9:25 o'clock this evening, when Thomas Reilly, a laborer, who boards in Charlton avenue, entered the house, and, pulling a revolver, shot his wife Mabel, who was at the time sitting in her armchair, not far from a sofa on which Sanford Duffey, son of the woman of the house, was lying. Young Duffey jumped from the couch and succeeded in holding Reilly until the police, who were immediately notified, had arrived.

Killed Instantly.
The woman expired almost immediately a few yards from where she was shot. Reilly, who is forty years of age, had not been living with his wife for some time, the couple having found it difficult to get along harmoniously together. Later the man became jealous of the attention which his wife's alleged admirer was paying to his wife, and the police believe this evening's tragedy is the result of this jealousy.

Shot Through Heart.
The dead woman and her four-year-

old daughter boarded with Mrs. Duffey, and she was sitting in the dining-room talking with Mrs. Duffey and her son, when Reilly pushed open the door, without knocking, and walking over to where his wife sat, he pulled a revolver from his coat, and with the words, "Well, Mabel," shot her through the heart. He then grasped her by the throat, and began choking her.

Young Duffey jumped from the sofa and grappled with the enraged man, and the woman finally succeeded in breaking away, only to fall dead within a few yards of the spot. By means of a desperate struggle Duffey succeeded in holding Reilly until the police arrived, and removed him to the central station, where a charge of murder was lodged against him.

The only regret expressed by Reilly was that he had not also killed Duffey. Dr. Anderson was summoned, but the woman was dead before he could reach the scene. He decided to hold an inquest, and the jury will be empaneled tomorrow afternoon.

Mrs. Reilly was 32 years of age, and was formerly Mabel Yeates, of Burlington.

HOME RULE MEASURE REJECTED BY LORDS

Bill Thrown Out by a Vote of 326 to 69—Marquis of Lansdowne and Lord Morley Wind Up Debate Before a Crowded Chamber.

London, Jan. 30.—As was generally expected, the House of Lords tonight rejected the home rule bill by a vote of 326 to 69. Mr. Gladstone's home rule measure, in 1892, was beaten by the Lords by a vote of 419 to 41.

The final debate, which was earnest and restrained, was well attended. The House was crowded throughout the discussion, as is rarely the case, particularly in the last two hours. The peeresses' gallery was thronged with women in evening dress who were glittering on jewels. A score of bishops, who rarely attend the sessions of the House, participated in the divisions, and the great majority of them voted against the bill.

Lansdowne's View.

The Marquis of Lansdowne, for the Opposition, and Viscount Morley, for the Government, wound up the debate. The Marquis of Lansdowne contended that there was no analogy between colonial and Irish autonomy. If, he said, a colony insisted on separating, Great Britain would have to consent eventually, but it was imperative, for

geographical reasons, to keep Ireland so long as they had a battalion of infantry or a battery of artillery left. Even as it was, said Lord Lansdowne, Ireland, under the bill, would be a menace to the safety of the empire in war time. It was, he declared, a constitutional outrage to force the bill upon the country under the machinery of the Parliament act.

Lord Morley commented on the difference of the temper of the present and past home rule bills. He said that now there was none of the ferocity which had been shown in the debates of 1886 and 1892. The opponents of the measure said there was no finality to the bill. Did they believe there would be any finality in its rejection?

"If you will go under the Orange flag, which I grieve to think, has been reared, do you believe there will be an end to the wearing of the green? You ask what we are going to do with Ulster. We ask what are you going to do with Munster, Connaught and Armagh?"

MANITOULIN GOES DRY

Canadian Temperance Act Vote a Win For Anti-Liquor.

Toronto, Jan. 31.—After the first day of May, 1913, there will be no liquor sold on the Island of Manitoulin. This state of affairs is the result of a vote taken yesterday under the Canada temperance act, which resulted in a decided win for the anti-liquor cause, and will mean the cutting off of twelve licenses in different parts of the island.

Eight municipalities are affected, among them being Little Current, Billings, Manitowaning, Kargawong, Shequim, Meldrum's Bay, Kalarney, and Gore Bay, where two bars will be closed. The Canada temperance act differs from the local option measure inasmuch as where the latter affects only one place the act deals with an entire county, and under it no three-fifths vote is required. Thus on a straight majority the entire island will go "dry."

Union Stockyards.
TORONTO, Jan. 31.—Yesterday's light receipts of cattle, following upon a shortage of supplies, once more met with an active demand. Practically everything was cleaned up at steady figures early in the session. Receipts were 63 cars, containing 584 head of cattle, 48 calves, 2,136 hogs and 189 sheep and lambs. A feature was the market for hogs. The run was heavy, but so keen was trade that they sold firmly at \$8.75, fed and watered, which is an advance of 50c on closing prices of last week. The market for cattle was quiet, following a strong market. Sheep were steady to firm, and lambs about half the price of choice. Butchers went at from \$5 to \$6.50, good grades from \$5.50 to \$6; mediums at from \$5 to \$5.50; choicest from \$5.50 to \$6; and common to fair at from \$2.50 to \$4. Springers and milkers continued weak, and some inferior stock went at from \$2.50 to \$4. Stockers were wanted again, and medium to heavy brought from \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt; about 100 stockers, weighing from 800 to 900 lbs., were bought by Mr. C. H. Normandy for shipment to the United States at \$4.75; heavy and backs from \$4 to \$4.75; lambs brought from \$7 to \$8.50, and calves from \$3 to \$10, with roughs all the way from \$4 to \$7. Trade was brisk for swine; buyers brought from \$7.75, fed and watered, and \$8.40, f. o. b.

C. Zeigman & Sons sold 40 cattle, including springers, at from \$28 to \$40; stockers at from \$3.50 to \$5; calves, 10; 10 calves at from \$2.50 to \$3; 12 veal calves, weighing 125 lbs., at \$10; 3 rough calves, weighing 310 lbs., at \$8; 1 lamb, weighing 110 lbs., at \$8.50, and 2 sheep, weighing 115 lbs., at \$5.25.

NEW YORKER SUICIDES IN WINNIPEG HOTEL
Member of Prominent American Family and Art Student Cuts His Throat.

Winnipeg, Jan. 31.—Twenty-four hours after he had cut his throat with a razor, the body of Eugene Delano, a member of a prominent New York family, residing at 12 Washington square north, was found Thursday night lying unclothed on the floor of his bedroom in the Royal Alexandra Hotel. He left a letter addressed to Eugene Delano, New York: "Dear father, sisters and brother, forgive me, Eugene."

United States Consul-General Jones was notified and wired the family in New York. The coroner gave permission for the removal of the remains to an undertaking establishment, where they are held, awaiting instructions. No reason is known for the suicide. Delano arrived at the hotel Wednesday, and did not leave his room after entering. He was dressed in the latest fashion, and appeared to have plenty of money. From papers found in his room he appears to have been a student at a New York art school.

Son of a Banker.

New York, Jan. 31.—The family of Eugene Delano, whose body was found last night in the Royal Alexandra Hotel, Winnipeg, confirmed today that he died by his own hand. "It was suicide," said a male member of the household this morning.

"Our advice, however, are meagre," Young Delano was 25 years old, a Yale graduate, and a son of Eugene Delano, a well-known New York banker. He left New York for Winnipeg on Friday last. He was in good health and spirits and the family can assign no motive for his act.

Young Delano was well known in club and athletic circles. His father is a member of the banking firm of Brown, Bros. Co., and a director of the Bank and Aroostook Railroad Company, and of the Fourth National Bank. He has Canadian interests, and it is supposed that the son went to Winnipeg in this connection.

CASTRO BARRED BY NAGEL'S DECISION

Secretary Brands Venezuela's Former President as Undesirable Alien.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Secretary of Commerce and Labor Nagel this afternoon decided that General Cipriano Castro must be excluded from the United States as an undesirable alien, thus sustaining the finding of the special board at Ellis Island.

Unless the former president of Venezuela can now succeed in getting a United States court to overturn Secretary Nagel's decision, he will be compelled to return to France or Germany.

Secretary Nagel based his decision on the ground that General Castro deliberately refused to answer pertinent questions put to him by the board in connection with the killing of General Parades. This killing, it was alleged, was without trial or hearing of any kind, and Castro, as president, was directly responsible for it.

Secretary Nagel reviews the law in the case and says that it brings forward strongly whether an alien seeking admission to this country can be permitted to refuse to answer a question based upon apparently authentic information and directed to a distinct ground for exclusion under the law.

"If this question is answered in the affirmative," says Secretary Nagel, "then every alien is entitled to the same privilege with respect to any question an answer to which may constitute an obstacle to his admission."



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FALL WAS FATAL
