Germans Have Strong Force Near Turn in Line.

LONDON, Oct. 2.-9:30 p.m.-The disorderly flight. battle of the Aisne, as it is still called, although the armies contending in it have spread far beyond that river, has and no decision has yet been reached. in the week that the results of the Allies' operations were about to be attained, were premature and from al appearances there must be more hard fighting before either side gives way. The communication added that the action was extending more and more northward, and that the fighting front now
