PUGILISTS FEEL STRAIN AS BIG BOUT APPROACHES

Although Outwardly Calm and Confident, Both Johnson and Willard Are Taking Fight Seriously and Looking For Hard Battle—Flooded With Letters From Cranks.

Havana, Cuba, April 1.—Arrangements have been completed for the selection of an alternate referee for the Johnson-Willard fight next Monday. The principals and promoters have agreed to meet late today for the purpose, and unless there is an eleven-hour upset their plans, they will select M. J. Hinko, of Cleveland. It will be his duty to sit at the ringside ready to step in to relieve Referee Welsh, in case the latter should be knocked out by a stray punch. The routine in both camps began early today. The pugilists were on the sports and walks are being cut down daily now.

Willard Confident.
Willard and his followers are so confident of the victory of the challenger that they have planned a triumphal entry into the United States of the "new champion" a few days after the fight. They expect to make a tour of the principal cities of Cuba on April 6 and 7. Willard's condition permits, and then go to New York by way of Key West, stopping at various places en route. Willard expects to be the principal figure at a great reception in Madison Square Garden, New York, after he says he will make a trip around the world. His plan is such like the one made by Jeffries previous to his defeat at Rangoon. He has no particular plans if he should lose.

Business Only.
Willard says that fighting is a business proposition with him, and that he hears no sentimentality about it. He says he will enter the ring calm and determined to win because he needs the money, and knows he can win it in the prize ring.

Johnson's Plans.
Johnson, too, says he has no hard feelings for his opponents, and would like to be on friendly terms with both before and after his fight. He boxes because there is money in it and not for the love of fighting.
