AMAZING RANGE

OF GIRL'S VOICE

Boston Ghetto Jewish Girl

Sings Three Tones Higher Than Geraldine Farrar.

Boston, May 18.—Those who should know believe they have found in Irene Cohen, 15 years old, coming from a humble home in the west end, a voice that will eclipse that of Geraldine Farrar and Rosa Raisa. Irene was dis- covered at the Boston Music School Settlement at 41 Allen street, an or- ganization run for the development of talent among the poorer classes, which talent would otherwise never be given an opportunity.

Although she has been taking singing lessons at the settlement only six months, her teacher here, Mrs. Humphries, says she sings three full tones higher than Geraldine Farrar and more than a tone and a half higher than both Raisa and Ponsello. Moreover, she sings three complete octaves, striking four E's with remarkable buoyancy and brilliancy of tone.

Beginning with E below the clef, Irene's voice rises to E on the staff, to soprano E, and then to E coloratura. With an electrical effect. The effect of the striking of that last E upon the listener is as if a huge diamond were suddenly split in front of him into a million sparkling, iridescent pieces.

Her teacher says no other dramatic soprano in the United States has a range that can compare with Irene's.

The girl has another year at the girls' high school before she can get her diploma, and then it is planned to send her to Italy for two years' study in an operatic career. Vaudeville man- agers have made all sorts of extravagant offers to get the girl to sing for them, but they have not been considered.

MEETING AT BLYTH

BLYTH, May 18.—On the fourth ballot today, Rev. D. N. McCamus of Clinton was elected to the stationing committee at a meeting of the Goderich District Methodists. Rev. Selborne Anderson presided at the annual session, which has been in progress here for two days.

It was recommended that Rev. Rufus L. Wilson of Bluevale be restored to ac- tive work, provided physicians think he is able to resume his duties again. He has been supplying on the Bluevale circuit during the year, and has done ex- cellent work.

Rev. J. E. Ford presided at the even- ing meeting, at which Rev. D. N. Mc- Camus spoke on "The Power of Chan- celism." Missionary contributions totalled \$10,215, a decrease of \$69, from last year's figures. Deficiencies in mi- nisterial salaries amounted to \$574. To meet this contingency in part the dis- trict gives \$381 from the augmentation fund. No changes are being made in the circuit boundaries.

The chairman of the district spoke most hopefully regarding prospects of an early union between the Methodist Churches in Clinton.
