METHODIST CHURCH FROWNS ON ABBREVIATED CLOTHING AND SUMMER RESORT DANCES

"The Clothes Are a Little Too Far From the Ground and Not Quite Near Enough To Heaven," Declares Rev. S. Anderson at Methodist Conference—Would Recommend the Young Ladies To Go To Bed.

That the Methodist Church frowns upon abbreviated women's clothing, gambling, dancing in colleges, schools and summer resorts, and the stigma attached to illegitimate children, was evinced by discussions which took place at the general session of the Ontario Methodist Conference in the Askani Street Church this morning.

Rev. S. Anderson of Sarnia, introduced the subject of "ladies' attire," but was greeted by a chorus of "ohs" from fellow delegates. "I would recommend some young ladies to go to bed," he declared. "It is disgraceful that our women ought to be decently attired at least."

THREE CHANGES IN THE LONDON DISTRICT MADE BY STATIONING COMMITTEE OF METHODISTS TODAY

Rev. George T. Watts for the Wellington Street Church—Watford Minister Goes to Hyatt Avenue, While Rev. W. R. Vance Will Be Stationed at Ilderton.

The final draft of the London Methodist Conference stationing committee, which sat to a late hour Monday night, was announced this morning. Three changes in the London district were made and two in Stratford district. Most changes in the first draft were made in St. Thomas district, the committee altering their first assignments six times.

Rev. L. Bartlett will be stationed at Malahide, and Rev. A. W. Sterling at Sarnia. Instead of Rev. F. G. Robinson, Fingal will be served by Rev. F. Burgess, and Mr. Robinson will be stationed at Onondaga. Rev. J. W. Pring goes to Stratford district in place of Rev. Leonard Bartlett, in place of Rev. Leonard Bartlett, assigned to Malahide. Rev. L. W. Hill, M.A., first drafted for Aylmer, will work at Parkhill, and Rev. William Fagan at Oil Springs circuit.

RELIEF FOR HOMELESS

Refugee Camp and Field Hospital Is Being Established.

Pueblo, Colo., June 7.—With plans laid for a complete census of destitute families in the flood district, for the establishment of a refugee camp, and for the installation of a complete field hospital, the equipment for which was expected to arrive at any hour, systematic relief work in this district began in earnest today.

ONTARIO WILL GO 'BONE DRY' ON JULY 18TH

Result of Plebiscite Has Been Officially Gazetted.

DECISION IN APPEAL

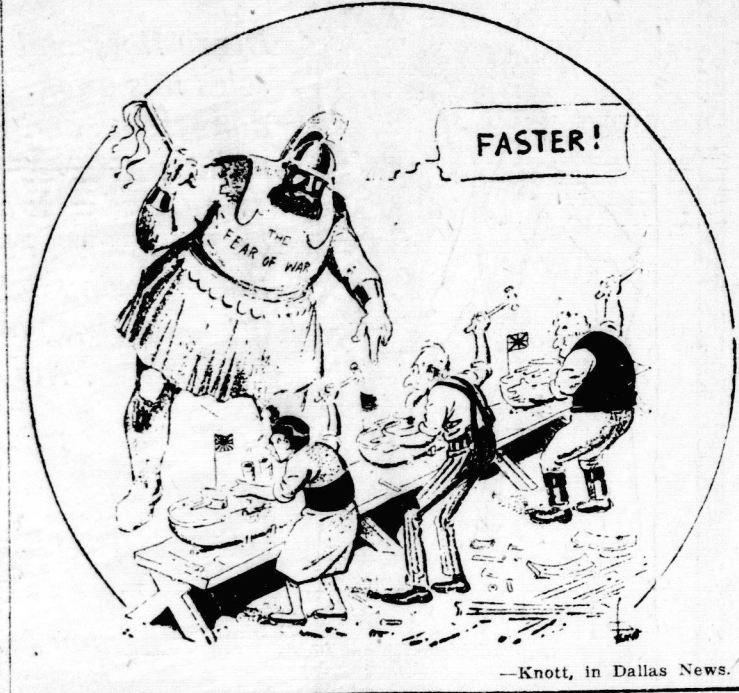
Alberta's Case Yet To Be Decided by the Supreme Court.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Ottawa, June 7.—Ontario will go bone-dry in accordance with the result of the recent prohibition plebiscite on or about July 18. The result was gazetted by the chief electoral officer on May 28, but the report will not go before the cabinet council until the 17th or 18th of this month, owing to the fact that it is held that the order-in-council fixing the date when the province will go dry cannot be issued until 60 days after the vote has been taken. The 60 days will have expired around the middle of the month. Therefore, when the order-in-council is passed, Ontario becomes bone-dry within 20 days. Importation for other than medicinal, sacramental or scientific purposes will then cease.

BLENHEIM WOMAN DIES SUDDENLY

Blenheim, June 6.—While in attendance today at court of revision, Harwich Township, Deputy Reeve Thomas Smyth of Kent Centre received a phone message that his sister, Mrs. Eliza Johnston, widow of the late Dan Johnston, a highly-respected and esteemed citizen of Harwich Township, at Kent Centre, dropped dead today at her home. She was 60 years of age, and had been reported in failing health, but her sudden death came quite unexpectedly to her relatives and friends. She leaves a grown-up son, Robert J., on the farm, and one daughter, Mrs. Harry J. Wilson, who lives in Harwich Township. Besides these are the following brothers and sisters: William, Geo. F., James, and Thomas (deputy reeve of Harwich), sisters, Mrs. Alex. Houston of Merlin and Mrs. Rencher of Western United States. Mrs. Johnston will be greatly missed in the neighborhood, as she took a very great interest in all the church activities at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, which is built on a property off the farm.

SMALL "REPUBLICAN" ARMY IS CAPTURED IN CITY OF CORK

Three Sinn Feiners Killed, Twelve Wounded.

Cork, Ireland, June 7.—Crown forces captured more than 100 members of the Irish "Republican" army in Mill street last night, after a battle in which three Sinn Feiners were killed and twelve were wounded. The casualties to the crown forces, it is said, were slight.

QUEBEC ELECTION IN NEAR FUTURE

Issues To Be Fought On the Recent Liquor Legislation.

Montreal, June 7.—Rumors are prevalent here in political circles that provincial general elections will be held shortly, either next fall or next spring. The reasons given are that very radical liquor legislation has been introduced on which a verdict is desirable by the people after a reasonable time has elapsed for its operation. Another reason is that the return of the Government would have the effect of strengthening and confirming the appointment of Hon. Mr. Taschereau as prime minister, since he has yet to face the voters of the province as head of his party. A further reason is that federal general elections are expected by the fall of 1922, and it is considered good policy to get to the provincial voters before the Dominion election, when the strength of the Liberal bloc in this province could be used to good effect.

LORD BYNG WILL OPEN TORONTO "EX"

Toronto, June 7.—Lord Byng of Vimy, Canada's newly-appointed governor-general, will officially open the Canadian National Exhibition here on August 27 next. A cable received this morning by John G. Kent, manager of the exhibition, from Lord Byng, said that he would be proud to perform the ceremony. The day will be called "Warriors' Day."

Battalion Detrains at Gleiwitz, in Upper Silesia.

CONTROL OF CITY

Report That Tracks Had Been Mined Is Proven Incorrect.

Oppeln, Silesia, June 7.—Detachments of the Royal Irish Infantry, the first British troops to cross the lines established by Polish insurgents in Upper Silesia, detrained at Gleiwitz yesterday. They assumed control of the city, and will be in charge of the garrisoning and policing of the place in future.

HUNGARY MAKES APPLICATION TO JOIN LEAGUE

Question of Admission To Be Considered at September Meeting.

Geneva, June 7.—The secretariat of the league of nations has received from the Hungarian charge at Bern formal application for admission of Hungary to the league. The application will be placed on the agenda of the assembly which meets in September next.

SUB-STATION ON BIG HYDRO CANAL IS DESTROYED

Loss Due to Fire at Montrose Estimated at \$100,000.

Niagara Falls, June 7.—The Montrose substation on the Chippawa end of the Chippawa-Quebec Canal was destroyed by fire last night. The fire was caused by a mishap to a transformer, and the building, of concrete, wood and galvanized iron, was completely destroyed. The damage to the canal will be retarded by this latest fire. Chief Engineer Gaby said the loss of the building would be small, but there might be serious damage to equipment.

STOP "LEAKAGES" AND INCREASE BUSINESS, ADVISES DR. CLARK

Member for Red Deer, Alta., Discusses Railway Problems.

Winnipeg, June 7.—The problems of Canadian railways were discussed here today by Dr. Michael Clark, M. P. of Red Deer, Alberta, who is on his way home from Ottawa. Increased business and the stopping of "leakages" were set out by Dr. Clark as the important immediate objectives, and the railways would participate in the "increased wealth and prosperity" which would be brought about by freer trade and a moderate taxation of and values according to the member for Red Deer.

PITTSBURG TINPLATE PLANT IS DESTROYED; LOSS IS \$3,000,000

Blaze Starts in Box Factory of Nearby Company.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 7.—Loss by fire, which completely destroyed the plant of the McKeesport Tin Plate Company at McKeesport, a suburb, late last night, was estimated at nearly \$3,000,000 by officials of the company today.

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CAN REDUCE UNEMPLOYMENT IN THE DOMINION BY BUYING GOODS MADE IN CANADA

J. S. McKinnon, President of C. M. A. at Opening of Convention in Quebec, Declares That Wave of Unrest and Radicalism Is Passing, But That It Will Take Some Time To Repair Damage Resulting From the Unusual Conditions.

Quebec, June 7.—Canadian President J. S. McKinnon declared that unemployment and the wave of industrial unrest and violence in the Dominion, Canada, has receded, and is receding, though at high tide it caused damage that will take time to repair. J. S. McKinnon, President of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, which was opened this morning in the Chateau Frontenac, in the course of his address as president.

WESTERN CROP CONDITIONS GOOD

Winnipeg, June 7.—Crop conditions are generally satisfactory in the western provinces, according to the second crop report of the Manitoba Free Press, published this morning.

RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS HEAR HAMILTON CASES

Ottawa, June 7.—Hamilton cases came before the railway commissioners here this morning. An application by the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company to construct a half-mile spur from Burlington street to the harbor area, Frank Waddell, city solicitor for Hamilton, stated that there was no objection to the branch line being constructed, provided running rights were secured for other lines in case they became necessary.

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
