WHEN BRITISH TROOPS ARRIVE

Battalion Detrains at Gleiwitz, in Upper Silesia.

CONTROL OF CITY

Report That Tracks Had Been Mined Is Proven Incorrect.

Oppeln, Silesia. June 7.-Detachments of the Royal Irish Infantry, the first British troops to cross the lines established by Polish insurgents in Upper Silesia, detrained at Gleiwitz yesterday. They assumed control of the city, and will be in charge of the garrisoning and policing of the place in future. As the troops consisting of one bat-talion, with full field equipment, en-tered Gross Strehlitz, northwest of Gleiwitz, they encountered the first Polish outposts. Machine guns had been trained on the station by the Poles, but when the British appeared, the Poles withdrew, and were not seen again. The train was held there for some time so that the officers could investigate a report that the track fur-
