HODGINS CHOSEN BY FARMERS OF EAST MIDDLESEX

Wins Federal Nomination in Field of Seven On Fifth Ballot.

RAP MEIGHEN POLICIES Bare Payment of \$7,642 To U. S. Clerk For 238 Days' Work.

With seven likely nominees at their disposal the United Farmers of the east riding of Middlesex in open session at the Masonic Temple Saturday forthrightly elected Arch. I. Hodgins, of Liddon, to the federal election. Arch. I. Hodgins, of Liddon, on the fifth ballot, three miles from the village of Liddon, the U. F. standard-bearer, had never been identified with public affairs until the inception of the farmer movement in Ontario. Since that period, however, he has been an active worker, and is at present not only president of the United Farmers of his own district, but holds the same honor with the farmer political body of the entire riding.

Large attendance and numerous speeches by the various nominees and visiting members of Parliament marked Saturday's gathering. London Labor was represented with more than thirty delegates, among them being several of the fair sex. R. H. Halbert, M.P. for North Ontario, and Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, M.L.A. for London, both delivered spirited addresses, the former denouncing in harsh terms the Meighen administration at Ottawa, and the latter lauding the record of the Drury Government in Toronto.

Nominations Made Briefly.
 After the convention was unanimously passed, admitting the press, the gathering was declared open by Geo. Bogue, secretary of the East Middlesex U. F. O., and nominations proceeded briefly.

The following 15 names were submitted, eight of whom, however, declined to allow themselves to stand for nomination: Stanley Shaw, ex-councillor of Dorchester; H. J. Heath of Hyde Park; James Ramsay of Thordale; Richard Fitzgerald, West Nisour, ex-reeve and county councillor; Leonard Craig, Belmont; T. H. Stanley, Granville; Walter D. Laidlaw, Wilton Grove; J. Hudson, Denfield; Mrs. Smith of Crumlin, a director of the U. F. O.; Frank Wilson, A. L. Hodgins, Liddon; John Dawes, Belmont; A. M. Dickie, Hyde Park; Isaac Needham, Bryanston, and Geo. Bogue, Lambeth.

Those who allowed their names to go before the convention were Messrs. Shaw, Hodgins, Heath, Fitzgerald, Craig, Stanley and Wilson. After the first ballot, Stanley of Granville withdrew. Following the second ballot, Shaw of Dorchester was eliminated from the race, and at the completion of the third ballot, Heath of Hyde Park and a favorite with the Labor element, was also declared out of the running.

Craig and Wilson tied. When the votes were counted on the fourth ballot it developed that Craig and Wilson were tied in last place. Both names were accordingly withdrawn, and in the last Mr. Hodgins emerged the winner over Fitzgerald. When the final announcement was made it was moved by Richard Fitzgerald, and seconded by Frank Wilson, that the nomination be made unanimous. This resolution was passed, amid tumultuous applause.

Addressing the convention, the nominee declared that he recognized the vast responsibilities attached to the honor. "Perhaps it may be," he said, "that I shall not be capable of filling them. I trust that I will, however, and assure you that I shall do my best in the interests of the people. I feel that there is a great honor in connection with the nomination. It is certainly something to have this trust conferred on me. In the course of time, if it be my good fortune to represent you at Ottawa, I assure you that I will do my utmost. "A great deal has been said," declared Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, Labor member for London, "about the labor and farmers' parties not being together. I maintain that as solid today as they ever were. As the farmers and the labor people are the producers, should they not be united?"

Lauds Doherty's Aims.
 The speaker then lauded the efforts of Hon. Manning Doherty for his activity relative to the cattle embargo, and referred briefly to the short and long term loans recently made possible for farmers. He deplored the continued and alarming exodus of young Canadians to the United States. "It is astounding," he asserted, "but nevertheless true, that Canada has sent more immigrants across the border within the past two or three years than any other country in the world. We must stem this tide."

Quite the central figure of the convention was R. H. Halbert, M. P. for North Ontario, and formerly by the farmers "as one of the founders of the U. F. O. movement." Although the hour was late and many members of the audience were compelled to catch trains for their homes, a goodly number remained and urged the federal member to continue his remarks.

Assaults Meighen Bitterly.
 Literally removing his coat, the latter immediately launched into a spirited and violent denunciation of the Meighen Government at Ottawa. "If these farmers who are leaving," he pointed out, "would stay and let their cows go for one night they would be money ahead in the long run. Our first duty to our family, our province and our country demands that we give their matters our full consideration, and there is no time in the history of Canada when the problems of the day have been as significant."

"The Government party is raising a great dust and din in a supreme effort to hide their own deeds. Don't let them fool you."
 Regarding the tone of the Mail and Empire recently. It refers to the last war and relates at great length how the Allies united against Germany as the common enemy. Then it draws a comparison, and suggests that the Liberals and Conservatives unite against the farmer as a common enemy. They insinuate that we are disloyal. Not long since your premier, Hon. Arthur Meighen, and his right hand stalwart, Sir George Foster, hinted that we were Bolsheviks, and in the same class as the foreigners who have been stirring up trouble by strikes.

Raps Mail's Stand.
 "But the Mail now explains that the premier did not mean the farmer in general, and goes on to elucidate that the Canadian farmer is not the Cretan farmer. Well, I am a Cretan man, and we have all ourselves with his group. Why should they call us disloyal, we who are rooted to the soil; we whose forefathers blazed the trails in the wilderness?"
 "It is simply because we have started to fight for ourselves, think for our-

Glass Flatly Denies Shrivelly Canard.

"I WOULDN'T take the position of sheriff of the county of Middlesex if it were offered to me. Such an idea has never entered my head."

This was the brief but emphatic denial S. F. Glass, member for E. Middlesex, gave when asked if there were any foundation for the persistent rumor that he had applied or intended to apply for the provincial office which may be vacated shortly by Donald M. Cameron, whose dismissal as inspector of prisons and deputy attorney-general of Ontario recommended.

He himself and act for ourselves. You have heard of the vast extravagance of the party, but I want to say that you have had from it honest statesmen, something that you have never had before. They are raising considerable dust over the "Bigges" road policy. I am not here to discuss provincial affairs, but I want to refer to the special edition of the Toronto Telegram that you received free while somebody else paid for it. It contained pictures of the highways. It claimed that Bigges built the roads, but if the truth were known, they were constructed long before he came into office.

The federal member then bitterly condemned the extravagance of the Dominion House and dwelt at length on the enormous expense of the plotting of expenditures for ships that are now being built.

Bares Extravagance.
 "There is a lot of dust raised," he continued, "about 'no truck or trade with the Yankees.' There will result, they state, an adverse balance of trade. What caused this adverse balance in trade? It is your federal government that has caused it by having to pay big interest on borrowed money. They talk about being extravagant and listen to what they did when they wanted to reorganize the civil service."

"They brought in the Griffiths force of experts from the United States, at an enormous expense. An example here is what it cost for one clerk: He worked 238 days at \$25 a day, a salary of \$5,950. He was employed 23 hours overtime at \$3 an hour. His living allowance was \$5 a day for 304 days. His traveling expenses amounted to more than \$100. The total being \$7,642."

Mrs. Smith of Crumlin, a director of the East Middlesex U. F. O., in declining to allow her name to go before the convention declared that "Saturday's gathering with so many women represented shows conclusively that we are living in a true democratic age."

Hits Meighen's Plan.
 H. J. Heath pointed out that Meighen had said that the tariff issue was the important one. He criticized the manufacturers who had failed to reduce prices since the war. The country is producing large supplies, he said, "but no present market is available for them."

"Such conditions," he warned, "will result in disaster to the industrial classes and wide-spread unemployment will surely follow. We demand a representation that will arrange a revision of the tariff that will make it possible for suitable trade agreements with other countries."

Frank Wilson touched briefly on the financial situation, and claimed that the farmers had been paying income taxes to the manufacturers for years back.

James Ramsay denied that the farmer movement is an attempt at class legislation. Richard Fitzgerald declared that the people of the cities should not fault with the farmers because they wanted their representatives in Parliament.

"But Laboring Man."
 Lewis Craig stated that he came to the convention as a farmer and that he was of the opinion that there was little difference in the labor and farmer platforms. "What is a farmer if he is not a laboring man?" he questioned. T. H. Stanley lauded the early efforts of J. W. Morrison and R. H. Halbert, outlining briefly their early struggles to inaugurate the farmer movement and declared that the U. F. O. had first been thought out in the stable."

Walter D. Laidlaw of Wilton Grove, commended the platform of the National Progressive party and predicted its continued growth.

John Dawes of Belmont expressed the opinion that the destiny of Canada rested in the hands of the next federal house. He declared that the farmer movement was sufficiently broad to include all classes.

Mrs. Thos. Robson of London spoke at length, while Isaac Needham of Bryanston, and A. M. Dickie of Hyde Park made brief addresses when declining to enter the race for nomination.

KLAN INVISIBLE AS YET INQUIRY IN CITY SHOWS

"Youngbloods," Prompted by Love of Adventure, Alone Champion Tenets.

WASHINGTON QUIZ LOOMS Reputable Citizens Denounce Order As Unnecessary On Dominion Soil.

[Exclusive Staff Special.]

Ontario is awaiting with interest developments in connection with the Ku Klux Klan which have promised to materialize, but which have as yet proven conspicuous by their absence.

While reports emanating from other cities in the Dominion, notably Montreal, to the effect that the "invisible empire" is gaining a foothold in Canada are rampant, London is apparently being overlooked, or the organizing klansmen are extra vigilant in concealing their operations here.

It is true that several prominent citizens have been asked if they were interested in the organization, but no further steps have been taken, and those who responded in the affirmative now consider themselves on the waiting list, with nothing to report. Some even brand the overtures as a practical joke originated by friends.

A branch of the organization was declared to be already in existence in Montreal, but it is not yet a chartered "arm" of the parent body in the United States, although application for a charter is reported to have been forwarded to Col. William Joseph Simmons, Imperial Wizard or "Emperor" of the secret clan at his palace in Atlanta, Georgia.

Opinion Well Divided.
 Opinion seems to be fairly well divided in London as to the objects of the Ku Klux Klan, many leading citizens being emphatic in their denunciation of the order, declaring that there is no necessity for it in Canada.

A few persons, however, apparently would welcome such an organization in the city, indeed they are literally "itching" to don the white robes emblematic of the Klan.

This minority includes those youngbloods, who, denied an opportunity to revel in adventure during the war, have turned to the organization as a means of escape from the monotony of life in the mysterious order as an opportunity fraught with promise of adventure.

Many of those in the first class in pointing out that the Ku Klux Klan may be necessary in certain parts of the continent of America, such as the southern districts of the United States, where persons are persecuted and where influential persons from time to time have advocated the intermarriage of all races and creeds, declare that London is no place for its activities to be staged.

Heinous Crimes Cited.
 Many heinous crimes of maltreatment have been laid at the door of the Klan, but in justice to this much-maligned body, it must be admitted that a large percentage of these offences against humanity have been committed by blackguards, who mindless of the current gossip concerning the Klan, have taken advantage of it, and in the guise of klansmen have ridden forth in the night to pursue various forms of devilry.

It is regarded as highly improbable that the Klan will gain a strong foothold in Canada. In the first place the governing authorities will probably take drastic action if the activities of the members become too pronounced, and the land of the Maple is known to the world as a stern administrator of justice.

For this reason, if any of the many escapades attributed to the Klan in the United States are perpetrated here, swift retribution is bound to follow. High ecclesiastics of the Roman Catholic Church have voiced their disapproval of the organization, and as Roman Catholics, a fair percentage of the country's population of thousands are opposed to the Klan, and as they unquestionably control thousands of votes, which must be conserved for the coming election, the "invisible empire" has not openly announced itself in this country.

In the United States so great has become the scope of the order that its activities are to be the subject of a national investigation, with proceedings commencing on October 11 at Washington. Public hearings will be held, and formal notice will be sent from Washington to William J. Simmons, Imperial Wizard of the Klan, to provide such witnesses as may be necessary.

Welcomes Investigation.
 It has been reported that Simmons has declared, on behalf of the body which he heads, that such an inquiry will be welcomed, and that all books and documents of the Klan will be thrown open to investigation. He is further reported as asserting that offences committed throughout the United States for which followers have been blamed were committed by night riders, desirous of impressing the community with the undesirability of his followers.

To gain membership in the Klan, it is reported that a substantial fee is exacted to cover the cost of robes, and other paraphernalia utilized by members of the order.

Accusations have been made that the joining members are "duped" as to the extent of the fee, and that they bind themselves to the order for life. According to existing regulations only native-born citizens are accepted, being self-designated "100 per cent Americans."

However, duped or not duped, the Klansmen themselves have lodged no complaint regarding the treatment they have received from their superior officers.

Initiation ceremonies are carried out in an awe-inspiring manner, candidates being transported in autos to lonely rural spots, previously selected, at dead of night. Here in the centre of a ring of white-robed Klansmen they take the oath of allegiance.

Work In Secret.
 Residents of the London district have as yet viewed none of these proceedings, which the conducted with the utmost secrecy. Nor have there been any reports received of ghostly Klansmen having been seen riding to or from their appointed rendezvous.

An added feature is the fact that no person in Western Ontario or in the entire Dominion has been singled out by members of the Klan for admonition at their hands, and feathers being as little in demand here as in the past.

For this reason, and because the fact that agitation regarding the order is becoming dormant in the district, it is thought that even though it is in vogue at Montreal the Ku Klux Klan is not in existence in London nor is there any likelihood of its becoming so.

Ku Klux Klan Wounds Nine in Texas Riot.

WACO, Texas, Oct. 2.—Nine men, including Sheriff Bob Buchanan, were wounded last night during a riot that resulted when the sheriff attempted to break up a Ku Klux Klan parade at the intersection of the main streets of Lorena.

Two pistol shots in the right side laid the sheriff low when he attempted to snatch a United States flag from the leader of the parade. The spectators rushed into the street and a general fight ensued, some firing pistols and others brandishing knives.

The marchers, apparently not annoyed by the intrusion of the sheriff, slipped away from the town after rescuing their flag and reformed in a quieter spot, marching away calmly bearing their flaming cross.

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Crime Wanes in Sunny Spring But Gains in Dark November

Weather affects crime figures in London. A glimpse at the quarterly reports of police court sessions will show this. It's a matter of psychology.

When spring comes and the sun shines for days at a time, the human mind is cleansed of evil thoughts that have lodged there throughout the dreary winter days. Then the number of cases before the police magistrate begins to wane, until June sees the minimum figures for the year. In July and August crime increased a little by the activities of sneak thieves, who take advantage of the fact that many Londoners are away at the lakeside.

However, their work is being curtailed more and more each year by the increased attention given deserted homes by the police.

The institution of a motorcycle force has helped greatly in this regard. During September and October the crime barometer is at the same level as the previous two months.

Then "the dull November days are here, the saddest of the year," and prospects of a long, hard winter have a bad effect on human minds, especially those individuals who lack the necessities of life to tide them over the winter season. The length of the nights at this time is also a factor, for it is a well-known fact that the majority of criminals work under the cloak of darkness.

Since the war unemployment during the winter months has been given as the cause of many robberies and thefts, for when the home fire is out and the larder is bare the law of self-preservation is the only one many persons in such unfortunate circumstances know.

BRAKEMAN IS KILLED BY FALL FROM TRAIN
