LOCAL COUNCIL JOINS IN WAR ON DRUG EVIL

Indorses Canadian Club Resolutions—Calls On Affiliated Societies For Support.

MRS. WRIGHT REPORTS

Citizenship Committee Disbanded For Present—Council As Whole To Act.

Power to the arm of the London Women's Canadian Club in waging warfare against the illicit drug traffic in the Dominion was given by the Local Council of Women at the meeting held Wednesday afternoon in "Lenmore," the King street residence of the Y. W. C. A.

After hearing the resolution which the Canadian Club adopted Tuesday, and is forwarding in the form of a petition to Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, asking effective legislation to cope with the rapidly growing menace, the council indorsed this by a standing vote. It was further decided to urge the many affiliated societies to sign the petition which will go forward to Ottawa.

Mrs. F. W. Hughes, president of the Women's Canadian Club, submitted the resolution. Its indorsement by the local council was moved by Mrs. Hughes and seconded by Mrs. Gemmell.

At the conclusion of a comprehensive report of the annual meeting of the National Council held in Port Arthur last year, Mrs. Gordon Wright pointed out that the action of the London Local Council was in line with a suggestion from the National to the local councils, that they do their part to combat the insidious advances of the drug habit.

Mrs. Wright further stated that she would see that the action adopted by the Canadian Club was taken up at the meeting convening shortly, of the Dominion W. C. T. U., expressing her view that uniformity in resolutions sent to the government was most desirable. Further, she hoped that the government would be deluged with these from all parts of Canada.

Act For Citizenship Committee.
The question of the citizenship committee, an outstanding one of the agenda, was solved by the decision to disband it for the present, the Local Council to perform its functions until occasion arises for the separate committee to render special service.

A bequest of \$200 from Mrs. H. A. Boomer, the former beloved president, was acknowledged by a standing vote of appreciation. On motion of Miss Macdonald, seconded by Miss Stella Macklin, it was decided, in accordance with the wishes of Mrs. Boomer, to use it as a nucleus of a contingent fund, to be added to from time to time.

Mrs. Gordon Wright reported that \$150 had come in from local councils scattered throughout Canada, and National Council officials, who were personal friends of Mrs. Boomer, as contribution towards endowment in her memory in the War Memorial Children's Hospital. In this matter, Mrs. Wright reminded the memorial partakes of a national character, in honor of an outstanding citizen of the Dominion as well as of London. Mrs. Sanford, former national president, had given \$50; Miss Carmichael, president this year, \$50; Dr. Augusta Stowe-Gullen, Ontario provincial president, \$15; Mrs. O. C. Local "Leagues of Nations."
In her report of the proceedings of the National Council annual meeting Mrs. Wright drew attention to the outstanding work of the council in various provinces, the crusade against the drug evil in British Columbia, the "Vocation Week," established in Alberta, to assist boys and girls in choosing vocations for which they were adapted.

Emphasis was placed on a recommendation to each local council from the national, based on the report of Mrs. Clements of Brandon, urging the formation of a League of Nations' committee in each local council to work for permanent peace. According to Mrs. Clements, eight such local leagues had been formed in Canada, to promote the establishment of permanent world peace.

Another recommendation brought by Mrs. Wright was that each local council pay its part in dealing with the problem of immigration. Each local council, she stated, was urged, as a result of representations made by a deputation of soldiers to the national, to appoint a committee to see that the needy dependents of soldiers were assisted in each community and that any injustice to them be righted.

Local councils were further urged to encourage education along the lines of art, through assistance with art exhibitions at country fairs.

Mrs. E. B. Smith, the president, drew attention to the work by blind operators, in connection with an exhibition of work done by the blind during this week at Gray's Limited.
