

FIND BULLET-RIDDLED BODY OF "WHITE SLAVER"

SAYS MUSSOLINI RULES ITALY BY RIGHT OF MIGHT

Descendant of Famous Violinist in London Discusses Italian Politics.

TELES OF FASCISTI

Thinks Revolution by Which Mussolini Rose But Preclude to Serious Upheaval.

A brief, but intimate glimpse into the affairs of the Fascist, ruling political party in Italy, was given to The Advertiser this morning by A. Paganini, who claims to be a descendant of the famous violinist by the same name.

Signor Paganini left this city early today for Montreal, after spending the night at a local hotel. His mission to America, he said, was of a business nature, but incidentally he intends speaking before the Montreal Publicity Association in connection with the Fascist movement of Italy. Unlike many Canadians of Italian lineage he views the group of politicians, of which Mussolini is the leader, with great disfavor. The suppression of news revealing the true state of affairs leads Canada and the United States astray with regard to their attitude on Italian conditions, he declared. The recent revolution by which Mussolini attained power is but a prelude to a more disastrous upheaval.

"The persistent acts of violence, massacre of hundreds of our best men, burning of property and general devastation," Paganini said, "and the large number of wounded and refugees have brought about an indescribably grave and threatening situation. Co-operative societies, which have been violently suppressed, can be counted by the hundreds."

Revolutionary Party.
"The Fascist is a revolutionary party who overthrew constituted authority," he added. "Col. Dockery of the United States military establishment, has recently been advising the American Legion, a returned soldiers' organization, that they may shortly be required to perform the Fascist role. He gives as his reason the election to congress last fall of a large number of members with whom he does not agree on these things. Progressive Democrats and some Progressive Republicans."

Mr. Paganini said he had seen an article published in the west, in which a retired Italian naval officer commends the Fascist movement to Canadians. There is no danger of it thriving in the atmosphere of Canada, but as it is spreading in parts of Europe, its significance is worth noting. All despots from Italy are strictly censured."

Reaction in Saddle.
The revolutionary party which reaction has become seated in the saddle in Italy, said Mr. Paganini, are condoned by the press both in Canada and Great Britain, and the revolutionary movement was immediately recognized by western powers. The statesmanship of Mussolini, the revolutionary leader, who defied constitutional authority and overthrew the government by force, is in many newspapers, highly praised. "Fascism," declared Paganini, "under various guises is spreading to several European countries, and is apparently seeking to gain a foothold in North America. It is one of the most sinister forces threatening society. Its power for evil is increased by its abuse of the sentiment of patriotism and by the approval of its methods by a large portion of the press."

Mr. Paganini predicted a radical upheaval in Italy. Mussolini was at present reigning by force of arms, but this could not continue with many progressive societies against him.

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Dr. Norman L. McLaughlin, "One of Old School," Dies

Physician in Michigan for Forty-Four Years—Beloved by All for His Cheery Disposition.

Dr. Norman L. McLaughlin, aged 69, born in East Williams, and for 44 years a physician in Michigan, died a few days ago in Findlay, Mich., after the car he was driving had been involved in a slight accident with a street car.

His car collided with the street car, sustaining some minor damages, and the doctor was walking around examining the broken wheel when he collapsed. An inquest later proved that his death was due to heart failure.

Dr. McLaughlin was the beloved physician of Findlay, a sympathetic friend of every patient, with a generous, cheery spirit that endeared him to his patients. He was a man who was ever on the side of progress and advancement.

Prohibition Pioneer.
He was prominent in the establishment of the public library, and was one of the pioneers in the prohibition movement, being president of the Hancock County Dry Federation. In the industrial development of the city he was as active as in every interest that concerned his town, and he furnished funds liberally for the purpose of developing industries within the city.

From 1892 to 1898 he was a city councillor, and was chairman of the Board of Health. He was mayor of Cass City, Mich., the city in which he first practised. He was a Mason, an Elk, and well known in all local activities.

He was married on Nov. 27, 1878, in Blenheim to Miss Emma Jackson, who died June 12, 1907. To this union was born one child, Ethel May. She was married to Herman W. MacPhail, a banker, in Washington in 1909.

Wife Survives.
In July, 1918, Dr. McLaughlin married Lena Gertrude Robling, of Columbus, who survives him, as well as his daughter, Dr. McLaughlin's sister in Port Huron, Mich., passed away only a week ago.

The esteem in which he was held by the members of his profession was shown by the eulogistic resolution passed by the Hancock Medical Society at their first meeting following the death of Dr. McLaughlin. The resolution, the longest ever passed by the society, in no measured terms proclaimed his sterling worth and character. "No service to the sick was too onerous. He was faithful to the highest ideals of the profession. He was an astute business man, fair and honorable in all his dealings, and above all he stood for clean politics—a leader in the community and the director of many campaigns to eradicate the liquor traffic."

Resolution Concludes.
The resolution concluded: "Wherefore be it resolved that this expression of our high esteem and deep appreciation be spread upon the records of this society and copies be furnished to the medical journals and to the local press."

The late doctor had a host of friends throughout Middlesex and Lambton counties. He was also well known in Strathroy and Watford. He had studied with Dr. Leander Harvey for some years. He came of that old Scottish stock that has always marched in the forefront of the Saxon race. He was a grandchild of Donald McLaughlin of Argyleshire in Scotland, and lived up to the finest ideals of his life of that prototype of his, Ian MacLaren's "Doctor of the Old School."

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SAY DRURY IN FAVOR OF WATSON REPORT

Commercial Travelers Return Pleased Over Interview With Premier.

Both Premier Drury and Mr. Raney expressed themselves to the commercial travelers' delegation who waited on them in Toronto on Saturday in connection with the Watson report, as being heartily in favor of the report, and especially in favor of the chief clause, that in which Mr. Watson recommended that hotels in the province be divorced from the enforcement of the O. T. A. on the grounds that the hotel business today had no relation to the selling of liquor and that less than one per cent of all violations of the O. T. A. were laid to the charge of the hotel keeper.

He promised also that the bill would be pushed through the House as energetically as possible, subject to the opposition that the government might encounter in the passing of the estimates.

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
