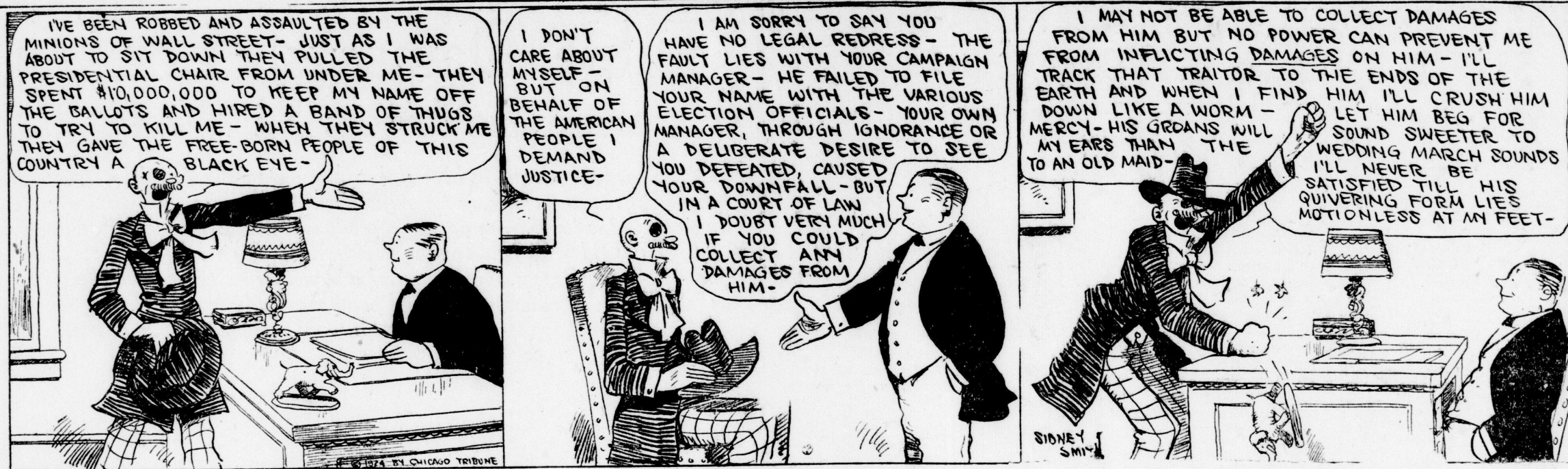

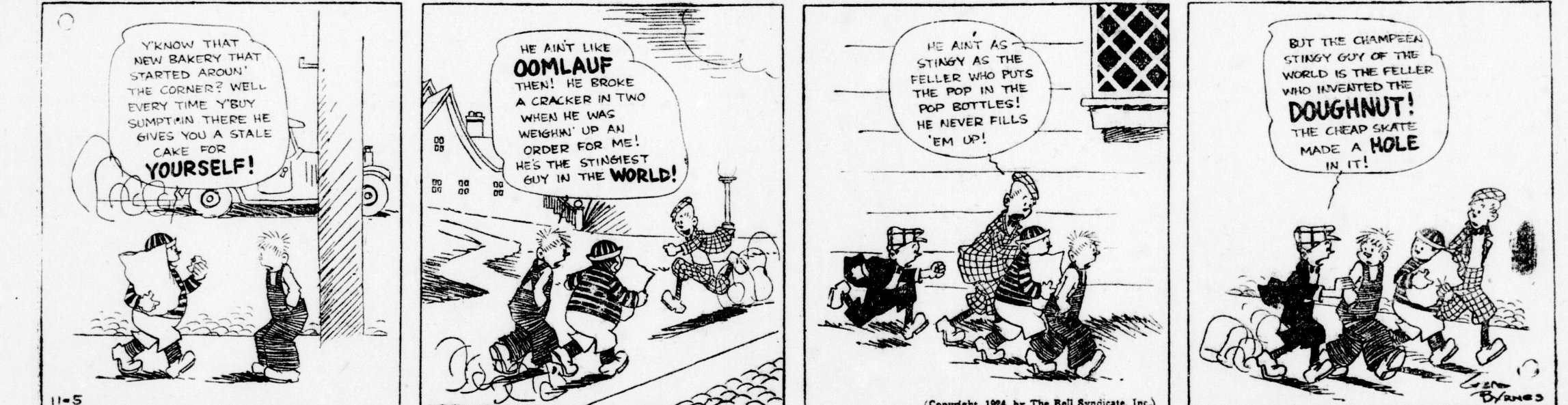

Section 3a of said Act is, in part, as follows: "In a Township, every owner of a dog shall procure from the corporation a tag for each dog owned by him and shall keep such tag securely fixed on the dog at all times." Every dog which does not wear a tag and which is found off the premises of the owner and not under the control of any person may be killed. Every owner of a dog who neglects to comply with the provisions of this section shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 and not more than \$25 for each such offence.
