It seems that if the country cannot confide in their ability, it is and in face of the sympathy that would tolerably safe in their weakness, for they are exceedingly sensitive to a little pressure. Why the Government organs gave no notice of their opening of this department, is easily understood. They are growing tired of recording the numerous backdowns of the Government. We should like to know, however, under what conditions this school is reopened : if the French Student teachers are to be treated as heretofore, or on their merits. The Moniteur throws some light on this subject, but if correct in its information, we must again condemn the regulations of this

The. Monteur says :- "Those who are considered worthy to compete for first or second class license, will be obliged in every case, to follow exclusively the English course At the end of the term, the students of the French Department will undergo examination for permanent license, but credit will be given them for their knowledge of French." By this regulation, every French student teacher, it matters not what his education may be, will be debarred from receiving a first or second class license, and must accept a third class, unless he knew English enough to enter the English Department. Why this harsh and unjust discrimination? should a student teacher, possessed of an excellent education and correct knowledge of the very language required in the schools, be forced to accept a third class license, while his fellow-student, with a poorer general education, perhaps is awarded a first or second class? During the last five years, one Acadian student entered the English department for every nine or ten who graduated from the French Preparatory Department. The effect of this regulation then, will be to crowd the service with third class teachers, many of whom will be unjustly deprived of first or second classes. On general grounds, such a step cannot be accounted for. Will the Department explain its motive? Is this another device for robbing teachers, or is the intention to oblige French student teachers to abandon the study of the French language, to the injury of their schools and

We ask for no favours, but fair play for these people. Let their student teachers' fitness be tested in the ordinary way, with due regard to the work they are to perform, and the schools in which they will labour. Let no arbitrary anomalous, and altogether unjust and unreasonable rule be enacted, which deprives their teachers of their rights, and their schools of much of their just means of practical subject.
