In the intercollegiate McGill and Varsity will likely fight it out for the championship.

In the inter-provincial Ottawa Rough Riders have the only chance to beat Argonauts out, and to do that they must win both in Ottawa and Toronto.

In the Ontario union St. Brigid's, of Ottawa, can meet the title with Parkdale by winning two games in Toronto from Parkdale and Toronto.
