

## ALL SAINTS' CHURCH WILL MARK 18TH ANNIVERSARY

Special Services To Be Held At Hamilton Road Church In Celebration of Anniversary of Beautiful Edifice Erected In 1907

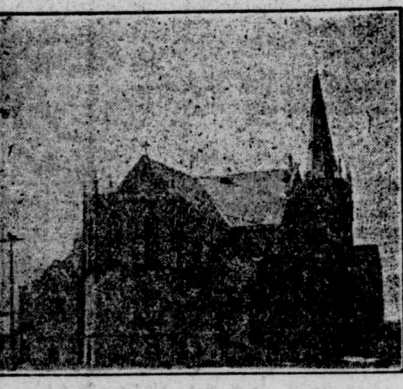
The 18th anniversary of a building imposing and of great splendor and beauty within is to be celebrated to-morrow. All Saints' Church, Hamilton road, erected in 1907, will be the scene of special services, at which Rev. William Lowe will speak in the morning, and Very Rev. L. N. Tucker, dean of Huron, in the afternoon.

At the first, a building in which were held mission services by Rev. J. B. Richardson, then rector of Cronyn Memorial Church, at the corner of Hamilton road and Adelaide street, the opening service of which was preached by the late Bishop Baldwin, All Saints' Church later reopened in 1890 in a new brick chapel at Tarkenton street and Hamilton road.

The year 1907 saw the present building completed. Rev. A. B. Rice succeeded Rev. T. B. Clarke as pastor in 1914, coming from Durham.

## Adelaide Baptist Church Now Important Force In City's Spiritual Life

Church, Which Started As Mission, Has Received 2,271 Persons Into Membership, Has Sent 12 Members Into Active Ministry and Missions Work

Celebrating its anniversary to-morrow, the Adelaide Street Baptist Church has the distinction of having received into its membership no less than 2,271 persons since its establishment on November 2, 1871. The Adelaide Street Baptist was first set up as a small mission on Talbot street, and recognized as a regular Baptist church in 1877, with a membership which totaled 78.

Up until 1885 the services of the church were held in an old frame building on the northeast corner of Adelaide and King streets, the former property of the Church of England. On March 1 of that year, however, an edifice was constructed on the present site of the church at a cost of \$9,500, and dedicated to the service of the Baptist church. During the pastorate of Dr. T. T. Shields, now of Jarvis Street Church, Toronto, the building was enlarged to its present capacity.

MEMBERSHIP OF 545. The church to-day has a membership of 545, and since its establishment has had as ministers Rev. T. A. McEwen, Rev. Jos. Forth, Rev. T. S. Johnston, Rev. H. C. Speller, Rev. D. M. Mifflin, Dr. T. T. Shields, Rev. J. H. Boyd, Rev. G. A. Leichter, Rev. P. T. Holland, and the present pastor, J. H. Silmon, who took charge on March 29 of this year. Some 12 of the members of Adelaide Street Baptist have gone into the active work of the ministry or

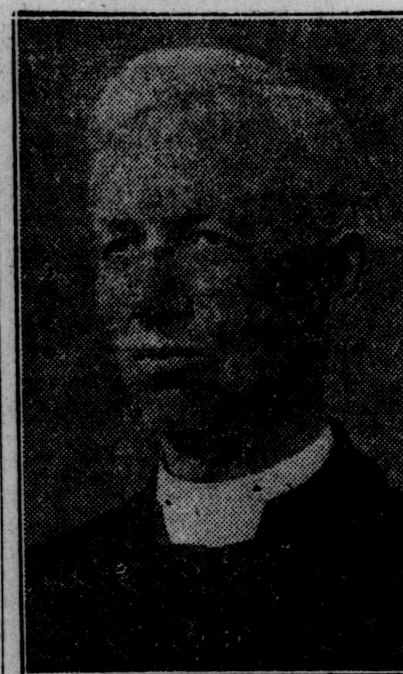

the mission field, and a number of its young people are at present in training for like work. The Adelaide Street Baptist is United and every department is in a strong condition to carry out the work to which it has been dedicated, and the church is considered an important force in the spiritual life of the city.

For the 45th anniversary to-morrow special services have been planned, with the pastor speaking morning and evening. Miss Agnes Calderwood, a Toronto soloist, of Windsor, is to sing at both services, while the organist, Geo. A. Smale will give a special organ recital on Sunday evening, beginning at 6:30.

was everything in the new work. It soon spread over Europe and most all other countries throughout Christendom, and now missionaries from their midst have penetrated almost all heathen lands.

The brethren are strictly fundamental and have no affiliation with Pastor Russell's followers, Christadelphians, Seventh Day Adventists and others. They believe in the plain, verbal inspiration of the entire Bible, the deity of the Lord Jesus, the Gospel record of the Virgin birth and His atonement by suffering and death, the bodily resurrection of Christ from the dead the third day, His present priestly intercession at the right hand of God for Christians, and also the second coming of the Lord Jesus, although they do not believe in setting dates.

The term brethren is used by them, not in a sectarian sense to embrace only themselves, but rather because it was a term used by the Lord himself when on earth, which included all believers: "Ye have one Master and all ye are brethren." Churches (or assemblies) having followed this movement, and sprung up on all sides and now cover all countries of Christendom, a large staff of new evangelists, pastors and teachers preach and teach in all lands, and lay preachers are encouraged wherever spiritual uplift is desired.

Gospel preaching to the unconverted and Bible studies for Christians are a chief factor of this movement.

### PASTOR DEFENDS MODERN NOVEL

Declared More Wholesome Than Old-Fashioned Books

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 30.—The old-fashioned novel, in which the impeccable hero always married the decorous heroine and lived happily ever afterward, was far more wholesome in its way than the sex-ridden fiction of to-day, in the opinion of Dr. L. M. Birkhead, pastor of All Souls' United Church here.

Dr. Birkhead, who is conducting a lecture course in his church on the relation of the new psychology to literature, vigorously defends present-day fiction. He says the prudish, over-sentimental novel of the past has been responsible for much maladjustment in marriage.

"Such fiction caused young persons to build up ideals which frequently came down with a crash," says Dr. Birkhead. "It caused them to have an 'Alice in Wonderland' movie attitude towards marriage and towards life. Instead of trying to present truth, then literature will be that way. In the past we have been too prudish and reticent about sex. We need the shock of the sex novels."
