VOICE OF THE PRESS

A third victory has been scored by Canada at the Royal Military tournament.

This time Private George Stewart, of the 48th Highlanders, defeats all comers from the regular and auxiliary forces, and takes the first prize in the Empire competition.

Canada's military representatives in England are doing credit to their country.

They are adding to the long list of triumphs we have had in many sports and military exercises in recent years.

A good reception should await them on their return home.—Mail.

Canada's Alien Labor Law, need not be substantially weakened by the clause which makes the consent of the Minister of Justice a condition precedent to any prosecution under its terms.

So long as Oliver Mowat is Minister of Justice public opinion will not be exhausted by the effort of persuading him to consent to proceedings for the protection of Canadian labor. And even if the Hon. L. H. Davies should become Minister of Justice, his refusal to put the law in force for the benefit of Canadian mechanics would load the Government with more odium than it would care to carry for the gratification of any Minister's personal antipathy to a painful, but necessary, law.

In Ontario at least public opinion will measure the benefits which the Alien Labor Law is to extend to Canadian mechanics. Public opinion has been aroused, and at every point where Canadian labor has suffered from the American law, a public opinion will insist that Canadian law shall be applied to American labor, and it is unlikely that any Minister of Justice will refuse to take the responsibility of putting the law in motion.—Telegram.

When they read some of the prophecies regarding apprehended jubilee day casualties and calamities in the British metropolis Canadians who have to stay at home will rejoice. The correspondent of the Chicago

Times-Herald has been considering the situation, and he records a significant moan of apprehension from the fire department. After a survey of the miles of pine board stands that have been erected along the route for the accommodation of spectators, the chief has declared that in the case of an alarm of fire when the crowd shall be in occupation of the streets it would be impossible for the department to respond with any effectual service. As a result of the Jubilee celebration of 1887 there were 482 hospital cases, besides twelve persons killed outright and something over 3,000 men and women fainted and fell in the crowd of standing sight-seers. It is estimated that as the crowd will be twice as great the casualties of 1897 will be at least 50 per cent. greater than those of 1887. But for all that June 22nd will be a gay occasion.—Advertiser.

Synod of Huron.

At the meeting of the Synod of Huron last week a resolution regarding Lord's day observance was adopted. The first abuse condemned was Sunday visiting; the second that of Sunday newspapers; the third, keeping open of store to a late hour on Saturday; fourth, that of entertainment suppers, etc., on Sunday afternoons or evenings; the fifth, the use of bicycles on the Lord's Day, except for necessary purposes. The latter was an increasing evil which should be condemned.

A resolution was passed that in the case of missionary congregations whose clergyman receive support from the synod funds sums may be deducted up to half the amount of the grant, to make up for unpaid assessments or similar charges due by the congregations to the diocese.

The resolution that women be allowed to vote at vestry meetings did not carry.

The resolution expressive of loyalty to Her Majesty on attaining her Diamond Jubilee was passed, after which all present joined in the national anthem.

An address was presented to the Bishop, who was much affected and said it would cheer him on his mission to the Lambeth conference.

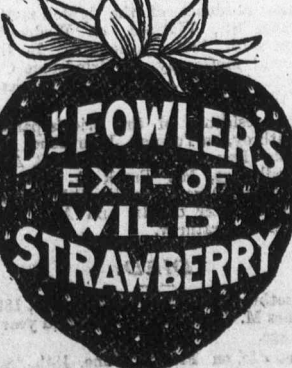

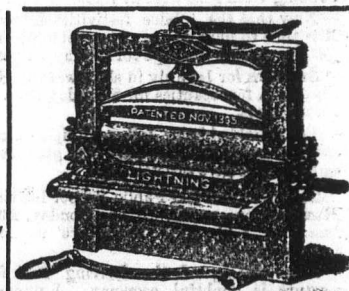
