Council met on the 8th inst. All the members present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The following orders were given:

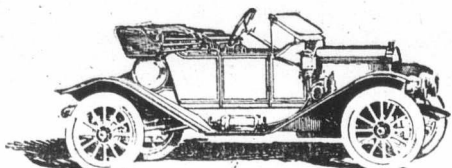
