Quelph, April 21.—To-day being Father Kenny's Feast Day, the children of the Separate Schools gathered together in the basement of the Church of Our Lady in honour of a beloved priest. A pleasant feature of the gathering was the presentation of a bouquet of flowers by Miss Ursula Dulgman and the following address, which was read by Miss Maggie Coughlan—

Dear Rev. Father,—Joyfully we come together this morning to hail with glad thought your Feast-day, an occasion of extreme pleasure to us because associated with many happy memories of the past.

We can never cease to be grateful for the tender watchfulness you have kept over us. In your every act towards us, we discern the keen interest in our school life which you constantly evinced, the spirit of emulation that you endeavor to infuse into our class work, and, highest of all, the zealous attention to our aesthetic and moral qualities.

NOTRE DAME UNIVERSITY AND MARCONI TELEGRAPHY.

The most wonderful test to which the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy has yet been put in America—that of telegraphing from land to a vessel two miles out in Lake Michigan, going at full speed in a heavy swell—was accomplished yesterday afternoon, says the Chicago Daily Tribune of April 24th. Professor Jerome J. Green, of Notre Dame University, directed the work. He was assisted by W. J. Kenny, city telegraph foreman of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad; Arthur V. Abbott, chief engineer of the Chicago Telephone Company; former City Electrician John P. Barrett, and Albert Kachur, of Notre Dame.





DEAN EGAN ON THE CORONATION OATH.

Barrie, Ont., April 24.—Insufferable, humiliating, insulting, intolerable, invidious, outrageous were a few of the characterizations which Dean Egan used last night in a scathing denunciation of the British coronation oath.

He said the Roman Catholic Church is the Church of Christ, and its doctrines were promulgated by Christ. Therefore, he said, the coronation oath speaks of as damnable and unchristian doctrines that Christ himself taught. The dean urged that the oath is an insult to 42 per cent. of Canada's loyal citizens. "But," said he, "before fifty years have passed it will be known and seen that Catholics are in the majority in this country. Obedience to Catholic laws will necessarily bring about that result. He pointed out that Alfred, Egbert, and other prominent figures in English history were Catholics, but since Charles II. the insulting oaths had been the law.

"Think," said the dean, "how humiliated Victoria was 18 years ago, whose mother was said to have been a Catholic, must have felt in having to insult such a large proportion of her subjects, Victoria as defender of the faith, was head of the nation; he had formulated this oath in the 17th century. This oath condemns ritualism, he said, "yet to-day you hear the clergy in England are ritualists who believe in the transubstantiation of elements, and the sacerdotal power of absolution, rites which the church condemns. This places the ritualists in the awkward position that they condemn, yet show that they are but returning to their first love."

Dean Egan urged every Catholic society in Canada to pass a resolution condemning the coronation oath and forward a copy of their resolution to Parliament.
