will have more efficient manufacturing plants, both in terms of production and equipment, and also in terms of labour production. This is taking place at the present time. It means that we are better able to compete in the world to sell our goods, both in Canada and abroad. If we were not more productive, we would even have more unemployment than at present. That is the first result of greater productivity. It shows in the record exports that we have at the present time. In Canada it shows that we are competing well in terms of other countries.

If you are going to be more productive and efficient, it will take some time before the plants expand and additional jobs are created. They are generated by increasing efficiency, effectiveness, and competitiveness. This is what we are doing. I regret that it takes time. I would like to be able to guarantee to my friend's constituents that they can have a job tomorrow morning, but I cannot guarantee that.

We have in place a set of policies which ensure that this country is becoming more efficient and productive. We are on the right track, and we will see a gradual reduction in unemployment. We are going to be able to compete in the world.

Mr. Mulroney: Mr. Speaker, while the Minister of Finance is hobnobbing with the can-can girls in Place Pigalle, I want him to know he goes with our blessing if he promises never to come back and touch the Canadian economy.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Mulroney: After the damage that he has inflicted on hundreds and hundreds of thousands of Canadian families, I hope he has the decency to stay there in his golden retirement.
