Leader at this point to tell us what the legislation will be for tomorrow. I understand that there has been some change in the proposed legislation to be offered by the Government already this evening. If I could have some information, it would be helpful to all sides of the House.

So if the Government spokesman would give us some information concerning the House business for tomorrow we would be very grateful.

Mr. Grisé: Madam Speaker, I take note of the question of the Hon. Member for Windsor West (Mr. Gray). I will immediately advise our Deputy House Leader and he will be getting in touch with the House leaders of the other Parties at the earliest opportunity.
