

FAVORITES HAVE THEIR INNINGS

Trumps Wins Lassie Stakes and John Furlong Captures the Handicap at Havre de Grace.

HAVRE DE GRACE, April 23.—With cloudy weather and a fast track there was good sport here today. Favorites won the majority of the events, but there were enough backers of the others to make things interesting for the bookmakers. The Lassie Stakes was decided by H. P. Whitney's from the start, the only question being whether Troxler on Trumps or Burns on Vega would flash first beneath the wire. John Furlong was considered by the talent the most lively mount in the handicap, but he was not by any means a sure thing. He won handsily, with Flying Yankee next in favor, in second place. The favorite, Monicler, regarded as absolutely sure to win the first event of the day, had to give way to Miss Monicler, the favorite, who won by a wide margin. AQUATIC MEN'S SPRING TRIALS

Oarsmen and Paddlers Training Hard—Senior Argos Down to Real Hard Work.

The aquatic weather has arrived, and the enthusiasts are taking full advantage of it every evening. From about five o'clock until dusk the whole bay front is littered with the watermen, and each in his own line of sport is sparing nothing to get into shape for the promises to be one of the greatest seasons in the history of aquatic sports in Canada. Last evening no less than a half-dozen fours, two eights and two or three singles were out, and they ripped things up in great style. Joe Wright personally coached the senior Argos eight, and they put in one of their hardest workouts of the season.

The canoeists were at it, too, and about a dozen racing skiffs were hovering about, couple of races to the main and back were held, but only about four are as yet in condition to paddle the distance. The boys are turning out well, however, for so early in the season, and the T.C.C. boys contemplate another successful season.

Several dinghies gave their canvas a preliminary stretching before starting the regular boating season, which will most likely begin on this coming Saturday or the week after, and, although the breeze was rather light, it was enough to keep the canvas taut. Most of the boats are sporting new coats of paint, while amateur and professional rowers are working hard on their boats at the different yacht clubs.

BASEBALL NOT A MINT SAYS PHILLIES' LEADER

Many Clubs, Both Major and Minor, Dropped Money Through Big Salaries.

NEW YORK, April 23.—"If a congressional investigating committee is appointed to look into the affairs of organized baseball," declared W. H. Lusk, the new president of the Philadelphia National League club, "it is interesting to know that the major league clubs and seventy-five per cent. of the minor league clubs lost money last season. This was due to the high salaries paid to the players and the heavy traveling expenses, which were increased by the big money spent in rebuilding ball parks."

The major leagues have contracted to pay nearly \$2,000,000 in salaries this season. Under the provisions of the national agreement, the players must receive every dollar no matter how much the club may lose. Each club stands on its own bottom. The club which loses its ownership, and neither the National nor American League is incorporated.

"As for the so-called reserve rule, professional baseball would become chaotic without it. It prevents the clubs in the minor leagues from signing away valuable players from the smaller and weaker clubs. If the clubs should build one another for stars every year, it would not be long before New York and Chicago would control the best men in the market."

"I will venture to say that more than ninety per cent. of the major league players of today are well satisfied with existing conditions, and would oppose any attempt to wreck the foundations of organized baseball. I hope that congress will turn on the searchlight, if only to show that the so-called organized baseball is unwarranted."

LONDON LIKES ITS TEAM.

LONDON, April 23.—(Special.)—Manager Enoch of the London Baseball Club had no less than 15 ball players out at work for their initial spring training this afternoon. From the manner in which they showed up at bat and in the field it is evident that London has corralled a very formidable assemblage and already the local fans, who have gathered in large numbers to witness the manoeuvres can see a pennant for the London Pecos.
