

two pounds. A number of farmers have a few acres of corn in each year, although Manitoba has not been considered a corn growing country, there are places where it grows very successfully, and one of these places is along the Brokenhead River.

Land can be bought at prices ranging from \$5.00 to \$10.00 per acre. Very little is in the hands of speculators. In order to purchase it it is better to go into the country itself.

The municipality has a very energetic Council.

Determined efforts are being made to have first-class roads and drains. The Council have arranged with the Provincial Government to expend over \$50,000 in drains and roads so that every depression in the land, likely to be a receptacle for water, will be tapped by a drain.

Gimli. THE MUNICIPALITY OF GIMLI is situated on the west side of Lake Winnipeg. It is a rapidly increasing and thriving Icelandic Colony, and the settlers there find remunerative employment in fishing on Lake Winnipeg. Stock raising is followed principally. The soil is generally good, and although agriculture has not been gone into to any extent, where it has been tried the results have been satisfactory. The municipality is wooded in the proximity of the lake, and now that the Dominion Government have had docks built at Gimli, Hinausa and Gull Harbor (on Big Island which forms a part of this municipality) good market for cordwood is convenient to the settlers in most parts of the district, steamboats call regularly at these ports.

This municipality formerly comprised only ranges three and four, but recently ranges one and two have been surveyed and opened for settlement. A large tract
