HOW THE BIRDS PROTECT THE ORCHARDS.

An experiment made by E. H. For-bush, state ornithologist of Massu-chusetts, has given proof of what birds will do for the farmer, if they are let alone. An old neglected orchard was selected for trying the experiment and selected for trying the experiment and special efforts were made to attract the birds during the winter months by preparing food that they especially liked and placing it where it could be readily found; for instance, suet which readily found; for instance, suet which was tied to the branches of trees, says a writer in The Home Progress Maga-

As a result of this effort, the birds. instead of leaving when the snow fell. remained; and chickadees, nuthatches. remained; and chickadees, nuthatenes, woodpeckers and creepers spent the winter in this old orchard, eating large numbers of eggs, of the fall canker-worm moth and the larvae of the 1911 census of England and Wales, there were 1,179,276 more females than the larvae of the partial of the larvae of the partial of the larvae of the larvae
