

CANADA'S BIG SHARE IN WAR MUNITIONS

Has Furnished a Large Percentage
of the Output of Various
Shells.

Ottawa, May 17.—Some idea of the work being done by the imperial munitions board and of the volume and importance of Canada's output of munitions and other war material may be gathered from a recent publication of the British war cabinet, giving a report of their activities for the year 1917. This official publication states that:

"Canada's contribution during the last year had been very striking. Fifteen per cent. of the total expenditure of the ministry of munitions in the last six months of the year was incurred in that country. She has manufactured nearly every type of shell from the 18 pr. to the 9.2."

"In the case of the 18 pr. no less than 55 per cent. of the output of shrapnel shells in the last six months came from Canada, and most of these were complete rounds of ammunition which went direct to France. Canada also contributed 42 per cent. of the total 4.5 inch shells, 27 per cent. of the 6 inch, and 20 per cent. of the 8 inch and 16 per cent. of the 9.2 inch. In addition, Canada has supplied shell forgings, ammunition components, propellants, acetone, T.N.T., aluminum, nickel, nickel matte, airplane parts, agricultural machinery and timber, besides quantities of railway materials, including no less than 450 miles of rails torn up from Canadian railways, which were shipped direct to France."

During the present year the call has been largely for 4-inch H.E. shells, and Canadian plants are responding with an output which represents over 40 per cent. of the British program for this sized shell.

ARBITRATION BOARD IN WINNIPEG STRIKE

Ottawa, May 17.—A board of arbitration to deal with the dispute between 250 members of the civic employees' federation and the City of Winnipeg has been appointed by Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor. The city will be represented by James Auld, barrister, and the employees by Roland MacWilliams. These two representatives will select the third member of the board, who will act as chairman. If they are unable to agree, the chairman will be appointed by the minister of labor.

This arbitration board will not deal with the employees who are on strike, such as the firemen, electrical workers, waterworks employees, teamsters and chauffeurs. The minister of labor has no authority to appoint an arbitration board in the case of civic disputes unless both sides agree. An application for a board has been received from the city, but the striking employees have not asked for one.

Canada's Tank Battalion Is Reviewed at the Capital

Ottawa, May 17.—Canada's first tank battalion, Col. R. H. Denison commanding, was reviewed this afternoon in front of the parliament buildings shortly before the house resumed after luncheon. A large crowd, including practically all the members of the house and their friends, were in attendance.

Major-General S. C. Mewburn, minister of militia, accompanied by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, reviewed the men on the grounds, and afterwards the troops marched past the side entrance to the building, the minister of militia taking the salute.

Killed in Airplane Crash At Beamsville Training Camp

Beamsville, May 17.—In an airplane accident at Beamsville at 11:10 this morning Second Lieutenant W. E. Clemens was killed. His father lives at 261 Frederick street, Kitchener.

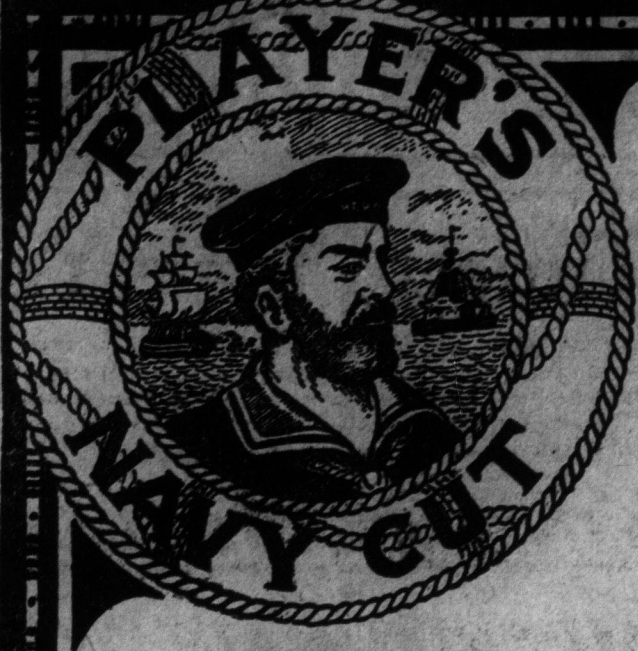

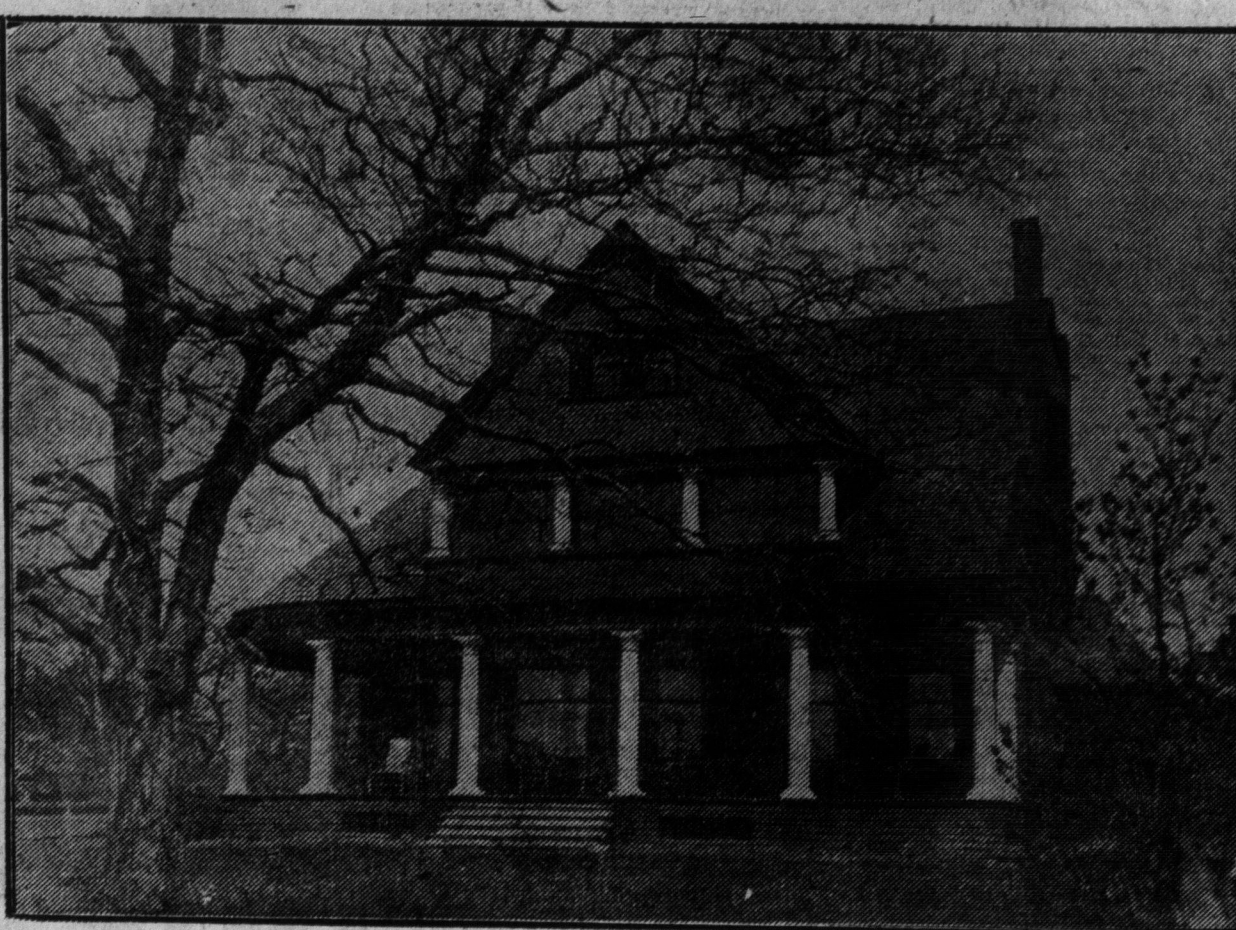

SAARBRUCKEN RAIDED BY BRITISH AVIATORS

London, May 17.—In spite of determined opposition by German air forces, British aviators on Thursday dropped bombs on factories and the railway station at Saarbrücken, in Germany, starting a fire on the railway. After bombing the town, the Britishers turned on the enemy, and in aerial fighting, says an official statement on aerial activities issued last night, destroyed five of the enemy machines. One of the British airplanes was lost.

ENEMY MUST BREAK BRITISH OR BE BEATEN

With the British Army in France, May 17.—If the Germans fail to achieve their aim in the new offensive—and all along this front there is confidence that they will—the defending forces will feel easy once more, for they believe that if the enemy cannot break thru this time he will have played his last high trump. If he is held again it will be the beginning of the end for the central powers, military experts say.

AUSTRIAN MURDERED.

Sault Ste. Marie, May 17.—An Austrian, known as Mike Smith, was murdered out in the eastern portion

of the city last night. He was shot in the neck and in the stomach. So far there is no clue to the slayer.

LIBRARY FOR COBALT.

Cobalt, May 17.—A move is on foot to establish a public library in town, and with this in view a deputation waited on the town council last night. The proposal would involve an initial expenditure of about \$700. No definite action was taken.
