The battle which took 300 cannon shots and shells to kill was at least four dollars. He was a faithful brute, with a strong mind of his own. Had he not shot to watch the pretty puffs of smoke which came from the port holes of each man-of-war, he would not have been so happy. But he stopped and refused to buy. Some claim that the deceased committed suicide by deliberately running into the two hundred and ninety-ninth shell, but this is only a report. Subscriptions are being taken up on all sides for a monument to be erected in memory of the heroism of the fallen. His picture is already out on buttons and souvenir spoons.

New York is Very Happy. Not since the reported demise of Li Hung Chang have there been such demonstrations of joy in the Metropolis.

U. S. Navy Goes to Buenos Aires. Hong Kong, April 20.—It is officially announced to-day that the United States has made a purchase of several hundred tons of crackers from the Chinese Government.

Very Necessary Precautions. Washington, April 20.—Owing to the number of senators, congressmen and other figures packing up and going to Europe while the war is in progress, McKinley has issued an order that all the public buildings in the United States be closed and watched by the police. The order is being strictly enforced.

Explosion of a U. S. Cruiser. Key West, May 1.—There was a terrific explosion aboard the United States cruiser Junco to-night, and officers and crew were killed. The cause of the explosion is being investigated. The ship was damaged and is being towed to port.

Island in the Wind. Ottawa, April 20.—It is reported that the Government will request that the flag be placed at half-mast on the castle opposite the postoffice, Toronto, as a tribute to the memory of the late President McKinley. It is also reported that the Government is still being performed by the American navy.

Washington, May 1.—(Special.)—President McKinley has issued a proclamation, ordering the immediate slaughter of all Black Spanish hens in the country.
