THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT.
Great Britain has no written constitution. The constitution is the outcome of a gradual evolution. It looks as if the greater imperial constitution is to be evolved in a similar way. Questions are arising from time to time affecting the mutual interests of the Mother Country and the colonies. No formal procedure exists for the settlement of these questions, but action is being taken in an informal way on each of them as they arise. The Pacific cable, a great imperial undertaking, was decided on without the aid of the Imperial constitution, and a beginning has been made in the establishment of an Imperial tariff on the initiative of the Canadian Parliament. There is no machinery by which Canada can be called upon to furnish troops for Imperial purposes. Canada, however, has reduced the matter into her own hands, and by sending a corps to South Africa, has admitted her responsibility to participate in the defence of the Empire. The precedents that are being established on these questions will, in the course of time, develop into a constitution which may be reduced to writing, but which will be as binding on the different parts of the Empire as the constitution which unites the king, lords and commons into a perfect whole.

The great fact in connection with the Canadian contingent is that Canada is sending out 1000 men to help the British in the war against the Boers, but that Canada admits her responsibility as a member of the Empire for contributing towards the defence and maintenance of the integrity of the Empire. What constitutional form the matter will take is not for us to say, but must be left for the future. Enough for the present is an acknowledgment of our responsibility. Time will solve this, as it will solve all other inter-imperial questions.

Canada should not look upon her connection with the Empire as an expensive luxury. Even if we view the relationship from a mercenary and material point of view, we think Canada has much more to gain than lose by her connection with Great Britain.

Where would this country be if it had to rely upon itself? If we existed as an independent nation at all, it would be on the sufferance and at the pleasure of the United States. As a part of the British Empire, however, we stand on a perfect equality with the citizens of any country on the globe. As citizens of the greatest Empire the world has seen, it is our duty and our privilege to assume the responsibility attaching to so proud a distinction. Canada will yet play a leading role in Imperial affairs. The sooner we recognize our destiny as the keystone of the British Empire the sooner will the idea become a reality.

Canada must not be coerced into doing her duty. She must voluntarily assume it. It is quite evident from yesterday's great demonstration in Toronto that no coercion will be necessary. The country is teeming with loyalty to the Queen and Empire. And yet only a few of those loyal and patriotic spirits are in the ranks of the Canadian contingent. It is generally recognized that the best guarantee of peace is an efficient armament. Hitherto we have been engaged in amateur, rather than real, soldiery. The time has arrived for us to go into the business in a businesslike way.

The Dominion of Canada must maintain an army proportionate to its resources and its population. This army, small though it be to start with, should be kept on a war footing, ready on the shortest notice to engage in active service. The next time an emergency arises it should not be necessary to call upon the militia, but we should have several regiments of regular soldiers ready for duty on a day's notice.

A BISHOP'S OPINION OF THE BOERS.
In a letter to The Boston Herald, which was written just before the outbreak of hostilities, the Rt. Rev. Anthony Gaughan, Roman Catholic Bishop of Kimberley, has set forth in no uncertain terms that England seldom had a more just cause for a war than for the one she is now waging in South Africa. "The state of things in the Transvaal," writes Bishop Gaughan, "was a scandal to the nations. I am not an Englishman, as you know, nor am my sympathies in general with England, but in this case I do believe that England will do credit to our common humanity by forcing
