For two hours yesterday afternoon the Board of Police Commissioners listened to representations made on behalf of five men and laundries.

Liberal Rally in Kilburn Hall

Addressed by Messrs. Hill, Robinette and Campbell.

J. W. MOYES AT RICHMOND HILL

Magnificent Reception to Conservative Candidate Who Intends to Carry East York.

Toronto Junction, May 27.—The large mass meeting at Massey Hall to-night was no doubt responsible for the attendance at the meeting held in the interests of W. J. Hill at Kilburn Hall to-night, which did not open until 8.40, and did not, at any time, nearly fill the hall.

A. B. Rice presided, and there were with him on the platform W. J. Hill, P. C. Robinette, W. A. Parsons, John Paterson, Arch Campbell, M.P., and Mr. Matthews.

T. C. Robinette opened the meeting, and gave a retrospect view of provincial affairs, dwelt upon the policy of building up New Ontario, and denounced the government from the West Elgin and Waterloo election frauds.

W. J. Hill laid claim to re-election on the ground that he had been instrumental in getting fenders upon street cars, and that he had been a supporter of the Supplementary Election Bill, which had taxed corporations to the extent of \$800,000 in the last three years.

He declared he would further not fail that the corporations should pay 60c on every \$1000, while a farmer's Good Roads scheme, he thought, was a workable scheme, and there are some clauses in it that he was not in accord with.

He regretted that towns like Toronto Junction, and villages like Weston, were not privileged to get a share of this grant. It was a county system first, and afterwards a municipal system. He was in accord with the legislature in its pulp wood policy, and hoped that eventually the paper

His straightforward and manly statements, coupled with the vigorous policy which he outlined to-night, in striking contrast with the do-nothing policy of the present member, have won for him strong support in this town and surrounding country. Mr. Moyes spoke for an hour, and was listened to with rapt attention throughout. Fairweather's Impressions

The Noted French Portrait Artist Passes Away in Paris, Aged 57.

A BRILLIANT CAREER ENDED

Long List of Likenesses Includes Famous Men and Women of Two Hemispheres.

Paris, May 27.—Jean Joseph Benjamin Constant, the painter, is dead. He was born in Paris in 1845.

Brilliant Career Closed. The fame of M. Constant's art was world wide. As a portrait painter he was popular in both hemispheres. In France he made his name as an "Orientalist," like Delacroix, Fortuny and Regnault.

His parents had intended to educate him for the church or for the medical profession, but he insisted on first attending the schools of Toulouse. Here his talent showed itself from the start, and all plans of other vocations were abandoned.

M. Constant in 1865 entered the studio of Cabanel at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris.

First Picture Sits. The artist's very first picture created a sensation at the salon—"Hammam and the King" in 1869. But it was his Morocco subjects that made him famous, as was his subject "The King of Morocco" in 1871, which was rich in contour, a past master in drawing and always interesting as well as being beautiful.

The list of his chief works includes: "A Woman of the Rif Coast" in 1873, "Frissoners in Morocco" and "Women of the Harem" in 1875, the great "Entrance of Mahomet II. into Constantinople in 1453," the portrait of "The French Republic" and of his famous father-in-law, Emmanuel Arago (who would certainly have been talked of "as a great artist" if he had lived), in the same year, "The Last of the Rebels" in 1884, "Justice in the Harem"—a gruesome scene, of which his beautiful studio, with its marble fountain, formed a mise-en-scene, in 1885; then the great "Justinian," which just missed the medal, and the pathetic picture of Beethoven playing the "Moonlight Sonata" in 1886, in which year he was awarded the gold medal crowned the official recognition he had conquered.

List of Fine Portraits. Among the likenesses of men the most interesting are those of M. Chaplain, the great medalist; the painter's sons, the younger being M. Andre, whose exquisite portrait, acquired by the government for the Luxembourg, obtained the high honor that was denied to "Justinian"; Lord Dufferin; the Duc d'Annam; M. Marechal, the distinguished baritone.

Those of women include Mme. Benjamin Constant, the Grand Duchess Paul of Mecklenburg, Mme. Calve, the singer; the Princess Radziwill, and, latest and most remarkable of all, the portrait of the late Queen Victoria on her throne in the Queen's Gallery, which was the notable gathering of portraits should be added the late Jay Gould, which M. Benjamin Constant executed during one of his professional visits to the United States.

200 FALL 20 FEET. One Man Killed and One Hundred Injured in New York.

New York, May 27.—Elvin L. Collidge, circulation manager of The New York Commercial, was almost instantly killed, this evening by the breaking down of a temporary sidewalk at Fifth-avenue and Sixth-street. Some of those hurt were those who were part of the crowd gathered to watch the parade of militia in honor of the visit of the French Rochambeau Commission to this city. Two hundred people fell on the sidewalk when it gave way, and they were precipitated 20 feet into an excavation for a new building, and fell on piles of building material.

White & Co., wholesale fruit and commission merchants, 64 East Front-street, received yesterday a consignment of six carloads of Jamaica fruits, imported by the Canada, Jamaica Steamship Company, consisting of bananas, oranges, coconuts and pine apples, the latter all of exquisite beauty, very large size and high color; also three cases of Ripley pines, which we understand are the first to arrive in the city. These are small in circumference, but rather long and very bright color. They also have rich con-signments of capadocia, star apples and mangoes. The latter fruits are well known to Jamaica travelers. They will be handled by the leading fruiterers here in the city, and are on display at White & Co.'s warehouse, 64 East Front-street.

Turned the First Sod. An interesting ceremony was performed in the city yesterday afternoon, when the first sod was turned for the new postoffice building on the southwest corner of Lager and Queen-street. The grade was in the hands of Archibald Campbell, M.P., and was laid out by George Anderson, Ald. J. J. Graham and Ald. Urquhart. Mr. Campbell was given the silver spade used for the ceremony.

Social Time at the Barracks. The sergeants of Stanley Barracks gave a social of the non-commissioned officers and men who are going from the regiment to attend the coronation. There are 31 going from the Dragoons and four from the R.C.R.I. Some good musical selections were given by Ben Harvey, Fred Bag and Eugene Fraser, and there was an abundance of refreshments.
