SMOKE CONSUMER BYLAW

Details to Be Arranged by Joint Committee of Aldermen and Manufacturers.

DISSATISFACTION EXPRESSED

With Bylaw as Proposed at Present—Monday at the City Hall.

For nearly two hours yesterday afternoon the Civic Legislation Committee talked about smoke consumers. The proposed bylaw was opposed by a deputation from the Manufacturers' Association, composed of W. P. Gundy, R. J. Christie, D. T. McIntosh and Secretary Stewart. They considered the bylaw as framed at present was decidedly unfair to the smaller factories and urged that further consideration be given.

Ald. Curry, with characteristic frankness, said that the manufacturers were practising economy in fuel, and where they saved a few dollars they caused thousands of dollars' worth of damage to surrounding buildings. If they would burn hard coal they would abate the nuisance, but it would cost them more. He thought they should be compelled to use smoke consumers. The discussion ended with the appointment of a sub-committee to confer with the manufacturers' committee with a view to framing a bylaw which would meet with general approbation. The sub-committee is composed of Ald. Graham, Starr, Noble, Ramsden and Harrison.

Will Oppose Long Delay.
City Solicitor Caswell will represent the city before the Railway Committee to-day, when the Yonge-street bridge matter comes up, and he will protest against a long adjournment of the hearing of the application. The C.P.R. is asking for the delay.

MANUFACTURERS ARE AROUSED.

Will Wait on City Council Regarding Question of Garbage Removal.

A special meeting of the Toronto executive of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was called yesterday to discuss the much-mooted matter of the removal of garbage. Representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association were also present, and the subject was thoroughly ventilated. A communication was received from the Board of Works suggesting that the city should remove two loads per week from any point within the city limits, and that a charge of 50c per load be made on any excess over this quantity.

A resolution was adopted, but it was decided to keep the particulars from the press, so that the City Council will be unaware of their views on the matter until the official deputation appointed to wait on the aldermen shall be able to do so.

HARNESS MAKERS CONVENTION.

Fourth Annual Convention of the Dominion Association.

The fourth annual convention of the Dominion of Canada Harness Makers' Association was commenced yesterday afternoon in Room A. of the Confederation Life Building. About 100 Knights of Leather and Buckle were in attendance when President Kelly called the meeting to order.

Mayor Urquhart, in a neat speech, welcomed the delegates to the city, hoping they would have a successful gathering, which would be of great benefit to the trade generally. He thought organization was the greatest thing of the day. Good must necessarily result from a centralization of the interests of such a large industry as that represented by this convention.

The president's address was short, simply dealing with the general standing of the association. The membership had increased considerably since the last meeting, but there was not enough personal interest taken by the members. They did not attend their district meetings often enough. He greeted the wholesale houses and the harness makers, as it was clearly in their interest to do so, the retailer more closely with affiliated houses.

Duncan Grigg, representing the Leather and Sundry Hardware Travelers' Association, welcomed the visitors to the city, and hoped their stay in Toronto would grow and flourish. G. M. Scherz of Cincinnati, secretary of the National Harness Makers' Association, was glad to be present with the delegates. Speaking of the membership fee charged by the wholesaler here, he said, the National Association charged no fee, but had an agreement with the wholesaler to the effect that he would sell nothing retail or to the consumer.

G. J. St. Leger, president of the Retail Merchants' Association, addressed the meeting upon the great gain the harness makers would derive by joining with the association.

J. B. Most of Toronto read a paper in the evening dealing with the question of the wholesale houses affiliating with the association. He said the retailer claims the wholesaler sells to large companies, such as army men, coal and ice companies and occasionally to private individuals, and hard-ware stores. The wholesaler claims the retailers often send a customer to him because they have not the stock he wants on hand, and so the harm is done in this way. Some of the country retailers did not carry stock, that is sets of harness, and the wholesaler was forced to go to the wholesaler and buy factory made goods. Local Union No. 30 of Sheet Metal Workers is Freed.

Service on a voluntary association which is neither a corporation nor an individual cannot be effected by serving an agent of the association. This was decided in the appeal of Local Union No. 30 of the Amalgamated Sheet Metal Workers' International Association, from the order of Chief Justice Meredith dismissing the appeal from the order of the Master in Chambers, refusing to set aside the service by this judgment is therefore set aside. As the point of law is a new one, no costs were decreed for either side.

The appellants in the case of Burnett v. Brock were granted a new trial yesterday by the Divisional Court. The action arose out of a purchase of property in the name of defendant's wife, which conveyed the defendant's creditors succeeded in having set aside the intention "to hinder, defeat and delay" such creditors. It appeared to the Divisional Court that the property had been paid for largely by the wife's money, and she was therefore entitled to a new trial by a judge other than the District Judge of Manitoulin.

Chancellor Boyd yesterday handed out judgment refusing to allow the taxation of the local Master at Ottawa in the action of the Baldwin Iron and Steel Works against the Dominion Carbide Co., Limited, to be disturbed. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Argument was heard by the Divisional Court in the case of Binnow v. Shields. The action arose out of the accidental death of one Binnow at Brockville, while engaged discharging a cargo of coal. The plaintiff, wife of the deceased, alleged negligence on the part of the employer, Shields, but was not-suited by the trial judge. Judgment was reserved.

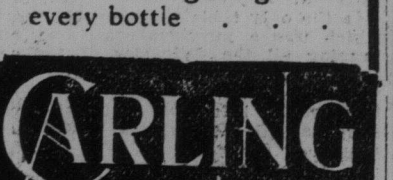
