100,000 TROOPS WILL BE NEEDED

To Pacify the Philippine Insurgents.

Gen. Lawton Preparing for an Important Expedition.

Return of U. S. Troops From the Laguna de Bay District to Manila.

New York, April 17.—A dispatch to the World from Manila says: Major-General Lawton, at Paito, today authorized the World correspondent to make this statement: "The present prospect is that one hundred thousand troops will be necessary to pacify the Philippines."

General Lawton's expedition has been ordered to Manila, and was preparing to return there immediately. All the territory he captured was to be evacuated, and all the launches he seized to be restored to their original owners. That is to say, they will be given back to the persons from whom Aguinaldo's soldiers took them. After giving the opinion that a hundred thousand men would be required to subdue these islands, General Lawton explained the situation to the World correspondent, as follows:

"The difficulties in the way are those of fighting guerrillas in a tropical country. With my brigade I could leave my way from one end of the island to the other if I did not have to hold the territory I traversed. But leaving garrisons behind would soon eat up the whole force."

General Lawton regretted exceedingly being compelled to evacuate the territory he had captured.

IMPORTANT EXPEDITION.
During the absence of Major-General Lawton's expedition to the San Francisco district, on the southeastern side of Laguna de Bay, the insurgents have been concentrating at the northern end of the lake, near Pasig, and the American scouts report that several thousands are already there. Gen. Lawton's expedition is now on its way back.

Two hundred and fifty Chinamen from Santa Cruz have arrived here. They left the town owing to their fear that the rebels on re-entering it would wreak vengeance upon them for favoring the Americans.

Gen. Lawton's expedition to the Laguna de Bay district, re-embarked, and anchored for the night at the head of

the River Pasig, and reached Manila yesterday morning, bringing all the men and the captured insurgent boats. Its object, namely, the capture of the insurgents' boats and the distribution of the proclamation emphasized by a lesson of American power throughout the lake region have been attained.

Gen. Lawton immediately began preparations for an important expedition on land.

There has been no fighting on the lake for three days.

THE FILIPINOS' POWERFUL ALLY.

New York, April 17.—A dispatch from Hong Kong to the World contains the following: "We are weak and you are strong," said Dr. Galliano Apacible, the head of the Filipino Junta here, to

me today; "but we have an ally, and you have none. We have 70,000 stands of arms, 20,000 troops in the field, and sufficient material to make cartridges to supply our troops for four years to come. Our ally is the climate of the Philippines. Your bullets cannot kill one of our men where disease will kill twenty of yours once you begin your advance into the interior. We will harass your advance, at the same time that we welcome it. We cannot fight pitched battles with you, and we do not need to. We shall be here today, and there tomorrow, attacking, then flying. You can no more catch us or conquer us than you can the wind. Thus far your civilizing army has killed about 6,000 of our people."

Nearly a Catastrophe

Fire in One of Old London's Fashionable Blocks.

Inmates Have a Narrow Escape From Death.

Batch of Russian College Students Ex pelled—Finnish in Revolt—A New Motor for Vessels.

London, April 17.—The British metropolis narrowly escaped a calamity today, which might have rivaled the horrors witnessed at the destruction by fire recently in the Windsor Hotel in New York city. Hyde Park Court, Albert Gate, one of the finest and most fashionable blocks of residential flats, overlooking the famous Rotten Row, caught fire at half-past nine this morning.

The building, which is eleven stories high, was built by the notorious Jabez Spencer Balfour, the former member of parliament, who was responsible for the collapse of the Liberator Building Association and other companies, by which thousands of people were ruined, and who is undergoing a sentence of 14 years' penal servitude as a result of his conviction on charges of fraud.

It practically adjoins the house occupied by Sir Herbert Naylor-Leyland, Bart., Liberal member of parliament for the Southport division of Lancashire, who married Miss Jane Chamberlain, daughter of H. S. Chamberlain, of Cleveland, Ohio. The fire broke out in the lower part of the building and spread up the elevator shaft with great rapidity.

The flames involved the upper stories before their occupants were aware of the danger.

When the alarm was raised the frightened servants dropped from the top windows to a veranda on the ninth story. The defective arrangements of the London fire brigade were again demonstrated, as the fire escapes were too short to reach the people in the upper stories, who only escaped with the greatest difficulty, while the fashionable residents of the lower stories streamed

out of the buildings, carrying what they could of their belongings. The flames were not under control until 10 o'clock, when the upper part of the structure was gutted. It is considered lucky that the fire occurred in daylight, or otherwise it would have resulted in loss of life. All the floors were supposed to be fireproof.

RUSSIAN STUDENTS EXPELLED.
St. Petersburg, April 17.—Another large batch of students belonging to the Technological Institute were expelled yesterday and were conducted to the railroad station in a body by a detachment of police. They were followed by other students, including many women, who then engaged in an orderly demonstration on the Newsky-Prospekt, but were stopped by detachments of foot and mounted police. The latter charged the students, dispersed them and made several arrests.

FINNS IN REVOLT.
Helsingfors, April 17.—The Finnish patriots are now in open revolution. Messaroch, the local correspondent of the Moscow Gazette, whose incessant and systematic attacks on Finland, her people and her institutions, have evoked great resentment, is subjected to a most complete boycott at the present time. The keepers of restaurants and shops refuse to serve him, he is insulted out of his lodgings by a patriotic landlord. The ostracized correspondent has been compelled to seek shelter in the barracks of the First Rifle Regiment, having failed to induce any lodging-house keeper to take him in.

CONDEMNED THE SPARROW.
London, April 17.—Mr. William B. Tegetmeier, the naturalist and journalist, has published a book on the sparrow, declaring that the bird is a pest which inflicts in England alone millions of pounds of damage annually.

NEW MOTOR FOR VESSELS.
At the Kiel naval yard the government has been experimenting with a vessel fitted with a motor, which is the invention of a Hungarian named Etienne Petriano. The advantages claimed are a row, a reversible action, facilitating steering and allowing the vessel to be driven ahead or astern. It is claimed the motor saves 50 per cent in fuel, that it does not require frequent cleaning, and that Herr Krupp offered a large sum for the world's patent, upon conditions which the inventor refused.

THE POPE'S APPEARANCE.
The Rome correspondent of the Daily News, describing the thanksgiving mass at St. Peter's Cathedral, says: "When the pope came into view the people whistled. He had the appearance of a ghost when his face, overshadowed by the great tiara became discernible with the dark eyes peering from the deep sockets. His hands trembled violently and his sad smile might have painted him then as the personification of the vanity of human splendor."

"With his left hand he waved sad greetings, while his right did his feeble best to mark the act of blessing. During the mass he sat with folded hands. Twice he rose and he was supported while he knelt in prayer, reading the benediction. His voice was scarcely audible, but in the absolute silence his first words were caught by the assembled multitude."

"He tried to raise himself, but fell back and pronounced the remainder in a recumbent position. A loud cry, like the bursting of a storm, broke from the congregation, and the pope, stretching his hand in benediction, was carried out."

CRUISER GROUND.
Brisbane, Queensland, April 17.—The German protected cruiser Cormoran, en route for Samoa from China, has arrived here. She reports, that on March 25 she struck a reef in the Bismarck archipelago, between Kaiser Wilhelm's Land and New Ireland, where she remained fast for six days. The cruiser will proceed to Sydney, N. S. W., for repairs.

MADAME NEVADA WAS INSULTED London, April 17.—The Paris corre-

spondent of the Daily Mail, recounting an interview he had with Madame Emma Nevada, the first American opera singer who has visited Spain since the war, and says:

"Madame Nevada's managers had arranged an operatic tour, but on the first night at Seville, though the house was bought up, the curtain rose on empty seats. The opera was 'Lucia de Lammermoor.' In the second act all the elite arrived together, but turned their backs to the stage, and talked ostentatiously until the end of the opera, when, on returning to acknowledge a burst of applause, Nevada was roundly hissed."

"At Madrid the queen regent was informed of the occurrence. Her majesty invited Nevada to a soiree at the palace, and presented her a diamond and sapphire bracelet. Nevada arrived here in a state of the greatest indignation."

CIRCUS TRAGEDY.
A dispatch from Chemnitz says that Prof. Baume, the famous high diver, was killed at a circus performance in that place while executing what was programmed as "the great Monte Cristo diving feat," in the presence of a vast multitude. The feat consisted in jumping from a platform laid across the beams of the ceiling of the circus 60 feet into a pool of water about twelve feet deep.

SELLING A MACBETH LEGEND.
London, April 17.—Mr. J. Mackay Bernard has purchased the historical estate of Dunsinane, in Perthshire, for £72,000. On the property is a well-known as "The Long Man's Grave." The tradition of the district is that Macbeth, finding it impossible to escape Macduff, threw himself from the top of Dunsinane hill, which is also included in the purchase, was killed upon the rocks, and was buried in "The Long Man's Grave."

KILLED BY A PETROLEUM CYCLE
Nice, April 17.—A curious accident, was witnessed Thursday evening in the Promenade des Anglais. Two men were riding along, one on a petroleum bicycle, the other on an ordinary machine. Suddenly there was a flame and a loud report, and the rider of the petroleum bicycle fell to the ground, writhing in pain. The other man, who was knocked down, an examination showed that the petroleum reservoir had caught fire and exploded, severely burning the rider on the hands, face and chest. The unfortunate man died the next day after painful suffering. The other cycle was shattered to pieces.

DUCHESS OF MARLBOROUGH DEAD.
London, April 17.—Lady Francis Anne Emily, Duchess of Marlborough, daughter of the third Marquis of Londonderry, and widow of the seventh duke of Marlborough, died suddenly yesterday morning of
