

CONFESSES TO CRUELTY TO HORSE

Livery Animal Badly Abused
by Seventeen-Year-Old
John Johnston.

"Guilty," pleaded John Johnston, residence unknown, when brought up before Police Magistrate Love this morning on a charge of cruelty to animals, preferred by Mr. Poole, the Talbot street liveryman. Johnston, as stated in yesterday's Advertiser, on Wednesday morning rented a rig from Mr. Poole, saying he would return it by 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon. When the horse was not returned at the hour mentioned nor during the night, the liveryman became alarmed, and notified the police, with the result that Johnston was apprehended at Springfield. Mr. Poole testified that the horse looked as though it had been driven constantly during the 24 or more hours it had been out, and it had been so abused and starved that he would not be able to make use of it for at least ten days or two weeks. A Springfield police official substantiated this evidence, and added that the animal's body was covered with ridges from whip blows.

When hiring the rig Johnston gave a fictitious address, in this city. This morning he said he was 17 years of age, and lived with his mother in the north end of the city. Johnston was remanded until Tuesday next for sentence.

James Harris, Frank Cahill and Jas. Harris faced his honor on a charge of drunkenness. "I think I will give you fellows another chance," remarked the magistrate. Whereat the countenances of the trio brightened 100 per cent. "However, on second consideration I recall that you compelled the arresting officer to run several blocks, so I will levy a fine of \$2 apiece upon you and confiscate the three bottles of liquor which were found on your persons."

Harry Holtenbach admitted that he had accumulated a rather large jag yesterday at Port Stanley, and was taxed \$2 for the privilege. "I did not see the policeman," replied John Copp, who asked why he had ridden his wheel on the sidewalk yesterday.

"That is a good excuse," replied the magistrate. "I'll fine you \$1 for not making a better one, though." Two minor cases were held over for a week and one first-time offender was turned loose.

Paris, Aug. 9.—The official reports received here from Casablanca, on the west coast of Morocco, practically confirm the statements made in the press dispatches regarding the bombardment of the town and its vicinity, and the scenes which followed, but according to the latest advices quiet has been restored. A large portion of the town is in ruins, and it is feared that the events at Casablanca will produce an outburst of fanaticism throughout Morocco, though the Government's representatives say that no undue effervescence has thus far occurred at Fez or other places in the interior. In addition to the French squadron, commanded by Admiral Philibert, and the Spanish warships which are off Casablanca, the squadron commanded by Admiral Jaureguiberry, consisting of the armored cruisers, Leon Gambetta, Dupetit, Thouray and Admiral Aube, is being temporarily held off Cape Spartel, in order to meet any emergency.

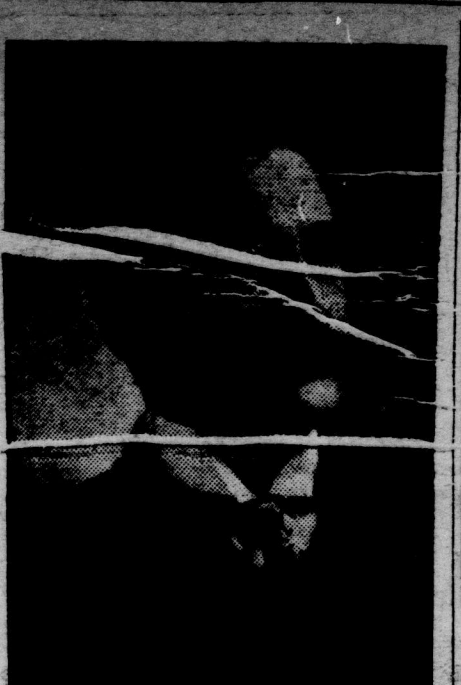
A GOOD APPLE CROP. Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 9.—After listening to the report of the executive committee, which stated that a good apple crop is in prospect, the International Apple Shippers' Association has adjourned to meet next year in Niagara Falls. The report said: "Our best crops extend from Ohio and Michigan eastward through New York and New England, and up through Canada, showing considerable excess over the crop of a year ago. —Victim Bled From Internal Wounds.

Chatham, Aug. 8.—With several ribs broken and a lung pierced by fragments of bone, Francis Cheff, an employee of E. Goodreau, corner of con. 5 and the Winter line, Dover, died during last night.

While he was attending to some duties in his employer's stable about 11 o'clock, a horse suddenly viciously kicked him in the right side, immediately below the arm, from the effects of which he died at 6 o'clock this morning after a physician was summoned, had done all in the power of science to stave off the inevitable.

Details of the fatality are not numerous. It is assumed, however, that when the unfortunate victim of the accident went into the stable, the vicious animal suddenly let fly, with the above recorded disastrous result. No one witnessed the accident.

When those living on the farm discovered the condition of Mr. Cheff, they immediately telephoned for a Chatham physician, who soon arrived. However, the resources of medicine were powerless, as the man had been so severely injured internally. After seven hours of intense suffering he bled to death from his internal wounds.

The victim was married and had a family. The widow and children are said to be living in Chatham, though the name does not appear in the city directory.

The Goodreau farm is situated about eight miles from Chatham.

The body has been prepared for interment, which will take place on Saturday from the Pain Court Church to the parish cemetery.

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TO ADVERTISE EDMONTON. Publicity Man May Be Sent to the United States.

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 9.—A unique proposition is now before the citizens of Edmonton, and has been taken in hand by the board of trade. The scheme is to send a competent man, familiar and thoroughly informed on the resources of Edmonton, through the cities of the Western States and Eastern Canada to solicit manufactures to establish here. The intention of the promoters is to encourage such industries only as will naturally flourish. These would include manufacturers of woollens, tanneries, canned meat factories, cotton goods and boots. A canvas for a \$2,500 fund is being made by the promoters, and the amount, it is expected, will soon be raised.
