

Will Not Ferment. Slice tomatoes finely, boil and strain through a sieve. To each gallon of juice add one quart of best vinegar, one-quarter pound of best mustard, blended with the vinegar, one pound brown sugar, one-half pound salt, one ounce whole black pepper, one ounce whole alispice, one-half ounce whole cloves, one-half ounce bruised ginger, three rei peppers and three medium-sized onions. Put spices and peppers in a cheese-cloth bag and boil with the tomato juice from two to two and a half hours.

meager shelter of a sheepfold-a walled inclosure without overhead covering-and remained there until dawn. On resuming their efforts to reach home they traveled across the moorland waste until they espied dwellings in the distance, which proved to be Ravenseat, in Swaledale, Yorkshire. Here they were hospitably received, and provided with food and change of clothing.
