London, Feb. 1.—The situation in niand is more reassuring, accord-ty to the latest reports received the Finnish legation at Stockholm and transmitted by the cor-respondent of the Times. The Red Guards have been disarmed or are willingly surrendering their arms all over the country. The revolu-tionists still hold Helsingfors, the

stockholm, Jan. 31.—Telegraphic and wire communication are broken between Tornea and many other Finnish points, so that it is impossible as yet accurately to follow the course of events in Finland. The latest reports indicate that the Government troops are in control of all of Finland lying north of a line from Vasa, on the Guif of Finland, through Haapamaki, Jyvaskyla and Saint Michael to Kexholm,

General Mannerheim's forces, which numbered 15,000, are now reported to have increased to 50,000, mainly by accessions from the peasantry, who are being armed with rifles taken from the Russians. His main force is believed to be moving southward along the coast towards Bjorneborg. General Mannerheim probably is in possession of the railroad from Haapamaki to Karelen, giving him communication between his main forces in East Bothnia and Karelen.

ITALIAN DASH BROKE SPIRIT OF AUSTRIANS

Enemy Shows No Further Desire To Tackle Diaz Troops.

SARDINIANS ARE SUPERB

Island Division Proves Irresistible in Fight for the Asiago Position.

Italian Headquarters in Northern Italy, Thursday, Jan. 31.—The splendid success gained by the Italian troops in wo days of fighting west of the Brenta River has been maintained at all points and the area of newly-occupied territory is being organized rapidly without further effort by, the enemy to regain his ost positions.

As the Italian brigades which took part in the fighting reassembled, it developed that their losses were compara-tively small, the aggregate being consid-erably less than the number of prison-

erably less than the number of prisoners taken from the enemy.

But the enemy losses were extremely heavy, as is shown by the number of dead left on the field and the reports of prisoners. It is estimated that the total enemy loss without counting the prisoners taken by the Italians was between five thousand and six thousand.
