## INQUEST FAILS TO REVEAL CAUSE OF INDIAN'S DEATH

Jurors of Opinion That Clarence Snake Was Killed by G. T. R. Train.

"We are of the opinion that the said Clarence Snake came to his death in the city of London, in the County of Middlesex, on or about November 23, 1941, as to what was the cause of his death or as to how it was brought about we are unable to state as the evidence has been so meagre. From the fact that the body was found on the Grand Trunk tracks near the Wortley road subway we are of the opinion that the man was struck by a passing train on the night in question."

This was the verdict of the coroner's jury which was summoned and held at the inquest concerning the death of Clarence Snake, an Indian from Brantford, Ontario, who was found dead on the Grand Trunk tracks near the Wortley road subway on Monday night at 11:30 o'clock with Dr. A. MacLaren presiding. The jury was in charge of Detective Thomas Nickle.

## CAMPBELL-MINNIS FEATURES WOMEN'S CLUB ENTERTAINMENT

Alberto Garcia Guerrero Also Won Great Applause at Auditorium Last Evening.

Every minute was full of delightful interest at the artists' concert of the Women's Music Club held last night in the Auditorium, with J. Campbell-Minnis and Alberto Garcia Guerrero supplying the program. The program itself was long, and there were other numbers graciously given at the request of a determined hand-clapping, yet the artists seemed to come too soon. Campbell-Minnis is a supreme artist and delightful

entertainer. His voice is a full, rich baritone, with a surprising quality in the lower register, and he sings as if he wanted to tell something, and was going to tell it properly, even if it was to sacrifice an opportunity for vocal display in the telling.

Last night his program of songs was whimsical in selection. They were mostly old-fashioned ballads, with some quaint child's songs at the end. Some were plaintive and sad, others were rollicking, but generally they were humorous, not stiff, sit-in-your-seat-and-smile, humorous, but real laugh-and-rollicking, and then at the end, as an encore he sang at the piano and sang "Forsaken," an old old melody, which brought tears to the eyes of the listeners and gave just a suggestion of what unexplored delights lurked in the voice and personality of the artist as he might appear in a different program.

Scotch Ballads.  
The first group was of Scotch ballads of a rather serious nature, and included "The Two Sisters of Binnorie," "How Could Ye Gang, Lassie," "Ye Fond Kiss," and "Jenny Nansie." The last number being the finest example of ballad poetry extant. The second group was made up of traditional English songs, and was exceedingly humorous. In this, there was "The Twelve Days of Christmas," one of those childish things which accumulate as they go along, and demanded wonderful breath control; "Robin a Thrush," "The Derby Ram," and "The Bockhilde Tragedy," a humorous parody on the first number of the evening, "The Two Sisters of Binnorie." The last group opened with a delightful modern French ballad, "L'Enfant Vagabond" (Bravado), which was sung with a show of the wonderful possibilities of his voice. The rendering of the ballads was in the spirit of the old-fashioned bard, the artist striving successfully to get the atmosphere of the days when news traveled by means of the snail.

Children's Songs. Pleasantly, and in catching the true spirit of the children's songs he was perhaps even more successful. He sang a waltz by Peet, entitled "The Little Child's Song About Beasts," and "My Ship and I," and a "Marching Song," also by Peet, the words having been taken from Stevenson's, "A Child's Garden of Verses." The listener was charmed and

felt that the singer must like "Alice in Wonderland" too. His personality was amusing, and he drew the audience with him as he explained to them something about a kind of music which very rarely appears on an artists' program except in single instances. It was indeed a fitting program for an educational club, and Charles Wheeler was an excellent accompanist.

Besides the singer there was Guerrero, the famous South American pianist, who has on other occasions won for himself many compliments in London. His program last night could be termed "Choosing numbers that would be enhanced by the passionate interpretation of a southern musician (he is a Spaniard), he held the audience by the newness of his way of telling the story, and amazed them by the wonderful effects which he got from the instrument which hardly seemed a piano under his magic fingers.

He plays Chopin's "Nocturne," not as the Venetian boatman himself might have played it, if he could. He fills it with a certain southern air, and Chopin could not have done it. This type of number, with its tender, pensive and its possibilities for dramatic brilliance, seems particularly suited to the pianist.
