Perrier last week somewhat retrieved his lost prestige by easily taking the trial at Newmarket, and has been installed as ochief favorite in the betting for the Derby. Two days later, at Epsom, the historic Oaks will be run, and Richard Croker's Rhodora, which is considered to be the best 3-year-old on the continent, is believed to be a sure winner of the race.
