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## The Seagram Horses Bring Fair Prices At Repository Sale

The sale of Seagram's horses at Grand's Repository yesterday morning resulted in some good figures. C. A. Burns was in the box and worked hard and patiently to extract the unwilling dollar. The sales ring was a picture with its plentiful decoration in black and yellow (Mr. Seagram's colors), its black and yellow robe-bound, well-tan-barked enclosure, its commodious new auctioneer's stand and its tiered rows of seats on each side, from which the small boy was most wisely excluded. There was a generous crowd in attendance, including the majority of the better known horsemen of the city and a number from a distance. Bidding was fairly brisk. Mr. Seagram's desire being for business and not for talk. Of course several bargains were forthcoming, the first probably being the two-year-old Merida, by Havoc-Martydom, by Imp. St. Blaise, that W. Lomas, Drayton, secured for \$50. Ira Bates also got a good proposition cheap when he secured Milverton, 3 years, by Milverton-Promer, by Kendal, for \$20. Milverton was thought by the stable as a promising candidate for the King's Plate. He is a stoutly built colt very much of the build of old Bowditch, and should carry weight and go far. Merry England, who could doubtless be trained to jump, was given away for \$25 to Mr. Moss of Preston. Mr. Seagram showed his esteem for the son of Imp. St. George and Wekonowit by telling Mr. Moss that he wished to breed a few mares to him. Milner, rather swayed in the back, but seemingly as lusty and vigorous as a two-year-old, went to Tommy Crow for \$20. Altho the son of St. Simon and Blat Athol's daughter, Marquis, is 18 years old, he must be accounted as cheap as dirt at a couple of centuries. Sir Montague Allan, whom everybody will welcome into the ranks of breeders, took a couple of superior brood mares, paying thru W. P. Fries \$170 for the four-year-old Reine de Saxe, by Cobourg-Princess Flavia, by Prince Rudolph, and the ridiculously low figure of \$90 for Sans-Coeur, a six-year-old mare by Imp. Golden Garter (son of Ken d'Or-Lery) and Sans-Coeur, by Winkler-St. Lager, half of Heartless, by Imp. Kantaka. H. R. Marshall paid \$120 for a two-year-old half-brother to Inferno, which he proposes to use as a polo pony. T. J. Smith of Vancouver took a couple including the jumping mare, Cattle Campbell, 5 years, by Love Wisely-Lady Campbell, by Barredine, for which he paid the highest price of the sale, namely \$340. **AGAIN ITALIAN CAR.**

Wins at Savannah—This Time Machine Is Driven by Frenchman.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 26.—Louis Wagner, a Frenchman, driving the Italian Fiat car, No. 14, won the grand prize race of 400 miles here today. His total time was 20 minutes 21 seconds. 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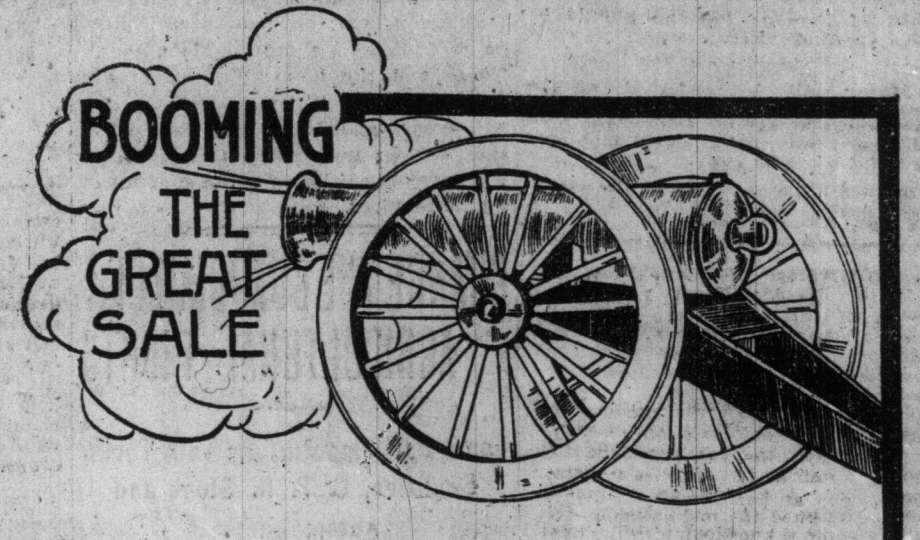
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## TOO MANY LICENSES.

Sons of Temperance Think So—Durham County Most Active.

The Grand Division Sons of Scotland at convention yesterday, passed a resolution approving the license reduction movement, which the report of the legislative committee said would cut off bars "which are now crowding each other for standing room in the business section, the only section in which they have been allowed to operate for many years." If successful, it would encourage the movement for repeal of the "three-fifths" local option clause and hasten local option contests in every city in Ontario.
