G. T. R. BRANKMAN HARPER KILLED IN RAILWAY YARDS

Was Acting as Conductor and Fell off Train—Aldermen and Hydro Power.

HAMILTON, Dec. 22.—(Special).—Matthew Harper, 68, West Macaulay-street, G. T. R. brakeman, was acting in the capacity of conductor of the passenger train on the Alandale Division due here at 9 o'clock, when it derailed on the Stewart-street station. Harper was missing. While enquiring were being made, a man was seen in the west end of the yard that a man had been killed. Investigation led to the discovery that it was Harper. Both legs were cut off and the body horribly mutilated. How he got under the car wheels is somewhat of a mystery, but it is supposed he fell off the train.

Wish to Evade Issue. The Conservative aldermanic candidates were called together this evening and requested for the sake of harmony in the party not to make the power question an issue at the coming elections. It was pointed out to them that several aldermen of the Conservative side had voted for the contract with the Contract Company, and that to make this question an issue meant making it hard for these candidates to secure election. The Hydro-Electric aldermen turned down the request and insisted upon making the power question the chief issue of the campaign.

Sent to the Central. For the theft of harness and some chickens, James Rees and Irwin Bantlaine, Hagersville, were sent to the Central Prison this morning by Judge Monck, for six months. Harris Gaskin, who had Mrs. Kotarain arrested on the charge of shooting at him, was this morning found guilty of assault, and sentenced for six months. John Cross, charged with a very serious offence, was tried and judgment reserved.

Party Government was arrested several months ago on the charge of holding up an operator at the Junction City, just west of the city. The trial was delayed owing to the fact that the prisoner contracted typhoid fever, and it has been explained that he was a victim of delirium tremens. He says he will insist on having the trial proceeded with.

At police court this morning Frank Lewis, a chauffeur, was fined \$10 for recklessness. G. T. R. Constable Brine has been appointed stationmaster at Brantford. Summer Home Ransacked. The summer home of Judge Snider at Oakville was broken into and ransacked. His honor says there was little of value in the place to be stolen.

Joseph McConley and Mrs. McConley have just announced their marriage. The groom is 27 years of age and the bride 22 years. B. B. Bond, Nashville, Tenn., under arrest on the charge of defrauding the First National Bank of between \$8000 and \$9000, has decided to fight extradition.

CENTRAL RAILWAY ENQUIRY. Members of Legislature Bought Off Competing Contractor.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 22.—The enquiry into the affairs of the Central Railway was resumed this morning. Hon. James Barmen, former member of the provincial government, told of the financial transactions of his company with the railway. A contractor named Wheaton submitted a lower tender for work, but his company bought him up for \$5000. Senator Thompson and T. Whitehead, M.L.A., were members of the company.

At the afternoon session George G. Scovell, ex-M.L.A. for King's County, swore he supplied the railway with identified payments to him by Geo. McAvity of \$2000 and \$1000 as the cost of a gravel pit which he sold to the company. He, however, found it difficult to remember details of this transaction, which was the cause of strenuous opposition from the opponents of the late government.

NEW POLICE DIVISIONS FOR GREATER TORONTO

Commissioners Make Important Changes Demanded by Extension of Boundaries.

With the incorporation within the city limits of the various sections making for a "Greater Toronto" the problem of an extended police system faces the city. With this the board of police commissioners grappled yesterday.

A lengthy discussion ended in a decision to a proposition to add three new divisions to the eight at present existing. By the new plan as laid out in a map drawn up the eastern limit of No. 1 division will move from Sherbourne-street to Berkeley and the western from John-street to Spadina-avenue.

The west limit of No. 2 will move from Beverley-street to Spadina, and the western limit of No. 3 from Bellwoods-avenue to Dovercourt-road, and the northern boundary will be College instead of Bloor-street.

No. 4 division will be shifted to Jarvis-street on the west from Sherbourne-street as at present. No. 5 will be shifted north to a point near the C.P.R. tracks and a new station built.

No. 6 will take in everything west of Dovercourt-road. No. 11 will take in West Toronto, requiring a new station should that city be annexed as likely. No. 8 will remain as at present, the eastern boundary being set at Coxwell-avenue. A new station and depot will be set at No. 9 between the present Nos. 5 and 7 at the north, the boundaries being set as Christie-street, Bedford-road, College-street and the city limits.

No. 10, a new division, will include East Toronto, and east to Coxwell-avenue. That of course, is all tentative and conditional. The contract for the new patrol wagon was awarded to J. A. Darch, Peoria, Ill. Licenses will not be granted till Feb. 1.

Street Traffic. Robt. Fleming, police commissioner and board of control discussed the question of the police taking over control of the streets, they got little further than at the last discussion, and will talk again. Mr. Fleming said he would be glad to do anything on the subject, if his company's agreement with the city. He admitted that perhaps nowhere in America was congestion worse than at King and Yonge and Queen and Yonge-streets.

Tried Lower Car Steps. A test to prove the practicability of a lower step on street cars so equipped was experimented with, when a run was made along the main streets and around some of the sharpest curves, such as the Victoria-street loop.

Among those present at the test were chairman Leitch and Mr. Ingram of the railway board; J. F. H. Wyse, engineer for the board; Manager R. J. Fleming of the street railway; City Solicitor Chisholm; Dr. Howarth; Mr. Murphy; the last named being responsible for the agitation for the lower step in the interest of the physical well-being of women. W. W. McRae, engineer, and other street railway men were present. Mr. McRae acting as motorman. Chairman Leitch and others present at the test would give no opinion as to the feasibility of the lower step, as the matter is still under consideration by the railway board.

DECISION A BLOW FOR DENTAL COLLEGE BOARD

Justice Anglin Rules That License Can Be Employed by Corporation.

A judgment given by Justice Anglin yesterday has the effect of limiting the power of the Dental College board. The action was one in which Herbert Moore Little, a licentiate of the college, sued for an order restraining the college from depriving him of his license.

Little is employed by the Toronto Painless Dentistry Parlor, all his license had been revoked on the ground that he had violated a bylaw stating that no graduate shall practice for a corporation or company, the owner or owners of which are not licentiates of the college.

His lordship gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff, restraining the defendants, their board of directors and committee from proceeding to exercise any of the powers which bylaw No. 44 of the defendants purports to create or confer, or from in any manner proceeding against the plaintiff.

One of the members of the dental board, referring to the judge's decision, claimed that judgment in this case was given in favor of the plaintiff because the bylaw was ultra vires, but that by the passage of the proper bylaw the board could still be in a position to exercise a restraint on the licentiates.

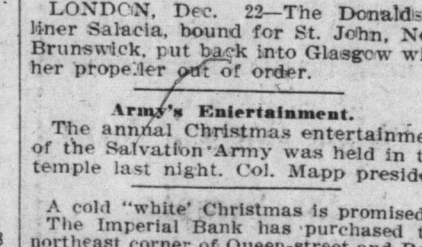
