City's Debt. Commenting upon the fact that the

net city debt is about \$27,000,000, that the city will probably have to contribute a large sum towards the Espianade viaduct, and is committed to heavy expenditures for exhibition improvements and a bridge across the Don at Queen-street, he said the net debt at the end of the year might be about \$30,000,000, so the city should aulower tax rate should be easily struck. 
