HUMAN FLY AIDS TO ANCHOR WALLS

No Search for Dead on Broad-
way Till Building Is
Made Safe.

New York, Dec. 2.—Aided by a
"human-fly" workmen today assumed
the hazardous task of anchoring tot-
tering walls of the nine-story Strath-
more Apartment and store building at
Broadway and 52nd street, half of
which collapsed Wednesday, burying,
it is believed, seven workmen in the
debris.

While the steeples of the glare
of powerful searchlights scaled the
walls, and at each tier made fast
cables anchored in the centre of the
structure, a corps of firemen dug
tongues of brick and plaster below,
searching for bodies of victims.

Traffic remained closed in Broadway
for two blocks and in 52nd street,
city building inspectors having de-
clared the remaining walls might
tumble at any time.

Building experts examined the struc-
ture at a late hour and advised

against further removal of debris,
which, they claimed, was serving par-
tially as an anchor. The city build-
ing inspector said no further search
for victims would be permitted until
the building was pronounced safe. Two
women seen to dart in a side doorway
of the building when the first rumble
of falling debris was heard are be-
lieved to have lost their lives, accord-
ing to a story told today by one of
the injured.

STEECHER TO RETIRE.
New York, Dec. 2.—Joe Steecher, world's
heavyweight wrestling champion, plans
to retire from the wrestling game after
this season, he said today.

In preparation for his contest here on
December 13 with Ed. "Strangler" Lewis,
Steecher has cancelled all matches in
order to be in the best possible form against
the Kentucky grappler.

LEWIS AFTER BRITTON.
New York, Dec. 2.—Ted Lewis, British
waterweight champion, and his manager,
Charles J. Harvey, are expected to ar-
rive here tomorrow on the steamship
Celtic. Lewis, who recently knocked out
Johnny Basham, former British cham-
pion, in the 19th round of a scheduled
20-round bout, is seeking a contest with
Jack Britton, world's waterweight cham-
pion, it was said today.

BOXING FOR MICHIGAN.
Ann Arbor, Mich., Dec. 2.—Classes in
boxing are to be organized at the Uni-
versity of Michigan in January. The Uni-
versity Athletic Association has signed
Ted Sullivan, boxing instructor of the
Detroit Athletic Club, as boxing coach.

EX-DEPUTY SHERIFF SHOT HEADING LYNCHING MOB

Goldboro, N.C., Dec. 2.—One man,
H. Furtell, former deputy sheriff of
Wayne county, was shot tonight by
the special guard of 12 citizens barrica-
ded in the Wayne county court
house, when a mob of citizens fired
upon the jail in the attempt to seize
and lynch five negroes, held for trial,
charged with the murder of a white
man.

The firing lasted only a few min-
utes. Barricaded behind felt mat-
tresses, the small force in the court
house returned the fire, and Furtell,
said to have been the leader of the
mob, was killed. The mob scattered,
but further trouble was expected and
a company of state troops is en route
here from Durham.

Acetylene Generator in Woodstock Is Destroyed

Woodstock, Dec. 2.—(Special.)—The
acetylene generating plant at the Stand-
ard Tube Company was totally destroy-
ed this morning. A spark ignited the
gas in the building. The damage will
reach \$2500, and the plant will be idle
for two weeks as a result.
