

LIKE BEING STRUCK WITH BIG HAMMER

Sensation of Soldiers When
Hit by Bullet on the
Head.

DEVOTION OF INDIANS

Impressed Britishers With
Friendship—Would Have
Left His Post.

The following is a letter from
Private W. Smith, 2nd East Lancs, at
the front:

It was about three o'clock, a bitter
cold afternoon, and as there wasn't
much fighting going on at the time, it
was decided to make some oxtail
soup for the boys.

I had been appointed sniper for the
day, but I hadn't been sniping
more than about twenty minutes when
I had a sensation of being hit on the
side of the face with a sledge ham-
mer. My strength seemed to leave
me all at once, and I fell into the bot-
tom of the trench on top of one of my
chums.

I was not unconscious, and could
hear what the other lads were saying.
One of them said "Is he dead?" and
another answered "No, but he won't
live long, the bullet has gone right
thru his head."

After attending to my wound they
let me lie where I was until it grew
dark, as our officer said it was too
dangerous to move me before then.
When it was dark one of my chums
ventured to take me to a collecting
station half a mile in rear of the
trenches. I could only just stagger
along, and consequently we only made
slow progress. Eventually we came
to an old house, where one of our
Indian sentries was posted, and after
the usual challenge had been given
and answered to his satisfaction, the
Indian saw what an awful plight I
was in.

He straightway volunteered to carry
me on his back to the collecting sta-
tion, but my chum deemed it unwise
to let the Indian quit his post in such
a manner as that, and we had to con-
vince him that he would be
shot at dawn for quitting his post
before he would let us proceed on our
way.

As we left him, I couldn't help
thinking of the true friendship and
devotion that these Indians have for
British Tommies. Eventually we got
to the collecting station, and now I
am enjoying a well-earned rest at
home, with the hope of an early re-
turn to the trenches.
